The agenda item requests the conditions 22 were provided to me as the Chairman and presiding 23 officer, and the items on today's agenda were found to



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which are for a condition that requires a favorable

meet at least one of the conditions.

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two-thirds vote of the Board before consideration of that item can begin.

The first one is the application, the ITEP application by ExxonMobil for application 20200425. The company expressed that it, quote "Anticipates that final investment decision will occur in the second half of March. As such, it is critical for this project to be considered at the January Board of Commerce and Industry meeting in order to achieve the local metro council and school board review and approval in February and possibly early March on their meeting schedules."

This application is therefore before the Board pursuant to Revised Statute 42.17.1(A)(2)(d), which reads, quote, "Other matters that are critical and time sensitive and that in the presiding officer's determination should not be delayed."

This same section requires that the members present approve consideration of this matter by a two-thirds vote. On that, I would entertain a motion that we consider the ExxonMobil matter.

MR. DESMARAIS: All right. Thank you. I'm with the First Unitarian Universalist Church in New Orleans, and this issue of tax exemptions has become something of a moral issue for me because I see the public schools and the roads of our cities and of our state are in -- being drastically affected by the limited income the state is receiving.

so I have looked up the impacts of tax exemptions in general, and I have found an article by Dr. Steve Lerch of Washington State Institute for Public Policy, and he writes that the analysis of state exemptions indicates that results of tax exemptions for corporate activity constitutes a very small effect that the -- I'm looking for the actual quote because I wanted to read that, but my computer is not working well.

In any event, his conclusion is that they do not have the desired effect, that they are basically giveaways to the corporations who would, in their normal



1	activities, decide to invest they're going to invest
2	anyway. So I urge you not to grant that exemption.
3	MR. JONES: Mr. Desmarais okay. I thank
4	you for your comments, Mr. Desmarais. I would ask that
5	we limit our comments to the motion that is on the floor
6	right now, and that is whether to consider the
7	application of ExxonMobil. And, Mr. Desmarais, your
8	comments are helpful, obviously, but if anybody else
9	wishes to speak, please limit it to the issue of whether
10	this application meets the qualifications of the
11	statute.
12	MR. DESMARAIS: I apologize. I thought I
13	was.
14	MR. JONES: No worries. No worries. We're
15	finding our way along.
16	Next. Mr. Broome?
17	MS. BROOME: That would be Mayor Sharon
18	Weston Broome this morning. How are you doing?
19	MR. JONES: Oh, thank you. Thank you,
20	Mayor.
21	MS. BROOME: Good morning. And I am here in
22	support of ExxonMobil's Industrial Property Tax
23	Exemption application. You know, these types of
24	investments are vital to increasing our economic
25	competitiveness in Baton Rouge, and this project



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certainly will be part of a foundation laid to make Baton Rouge competitive for future investments.

employer in Louisiana, and they provide nearly 6,000 employee and contractor jobs and operate many construction ancillary businesses that stand to benefit from such a large investment. So this project indeed will create a stimulus to our local economy to accelerate this community out of the pandemic recession with construction starting this year in 2021.

Exxon is working diligently to educate the community and elected officials on this potential investment, and if approved, I'm sure each local voting body is well aware of the project and their role in making this project come to fruition. So I, too, join the Governor, Louisiana Economic Development and the Baton Rouge Area of Chamber in support of this important investment opportunity, and I ask that you approve this item.



Thank you so much and have a great weekend. 1 2 MR. JONES: Thank you, Mayor. Thank you for being with us this morning. 3 4 Next speaker. MR. BAGERT: Hi, this is Broderick Bagert. 5 6 I'm with Together Louisiana. Hi, Mr. Bagert. 7 MR. JONES: 8 MR. BAGERT: Nice to see everybody. 9 The intent of my remarks are going to be more geared toward what we think this Board and the 10 11 press and others ought to be doing and that we shouldn't 12 be the only ones doing. And it's in part because we 13 never signed up to be the permanent and forever opponent 14 of specifically tax exemptions. We still don't see 15 several things happening. 16 The question on any project should be is this routine or is it competitive. There does not seem 17 18 to have been any serious analysis of this project to determine whether it's routine or whether it's 19 20 competitive. When you look at Exxon's capital 21 investment, like every other manufacturing facility, it 22 puts capital into its projects every year. \$240-million 23 is about what is spent in capital on the Baton Rouge



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over the last 20 years is 270-million.

facilities almost every year. The average every year

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A \$240-million investment is certainly very positive, but it's also very routine. When you see that that's not something that appears to have any location element, that is to say it's not a new unit, it's a modernization, it looks a lot like something that happens as the ordinary cost of business, and that shouldn't be incentivized.

Second, the question for a project like this is not is the investment good. Investment is good. It's does the investment need an incentive? Is there a public policy argument? There does not seem to have been any analysis done over whether this investment needs this incentive.

And, third, we're very concerned about the standard of job retention becoming a meaningless standard. If you can actually lay off full-time positions over the course of the project, and when the year starts, have a certain number of employees, and when the year ends, have 30 fewer employees and then characterize what's happened as you having retained all the people you didn't lay off, then you've done violence to the truth and hurt public discourse.

We don't know what's going to happen with ExxonMobil's employment over the next year, but they're saying publicly that they're going to be laying people



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off, and if that's the case, we shouldn't be describing what's happening as retaining the people they didn't lay off. We should be describing what's happening, which is, in this market right now, maybe for very good reasons, that jobs are being cut. We're the only place in the country that incentivizes routine modernization that results in the decrease of full-time employment.

So we hope the Board will give some serious consideration to this, but going forward, to genuinely analyzing whether these are necessary so we start having a more serious and less routine assessment of these exemptions.

Thank you.

MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Bagert.

I must not have made by myself clear. I will try to do it one more time. Let's limit comments right now as to whether the ExxonMobil application should be considered as a matter of consideration under letter "d" of the statute.

MR. BAGERT: Mr. Jones, I apologize for that because I was genuinely confused. That's what we thought we were waiting, but then when you said it again, we thought this was the time, and so that's initially what I thought was being considered, but apologies.

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MR. DIGRE: Thank you. My name is Peter Digre, and I'm representing Climate Reality Project of New Orleans, and I would like to ask you to analyze the opportunity cost of this. Number one, the kind of particulate matter pollution that Exxon emits has a very serious impact on the health of literally thousands of citizens.

A recent study by Harvard that studied every county in the United States discovered that just a tiny increase in particulate matter pollution leads to a very significant increase in COVID-19 deaths, and I can get you the exact information, et al. Many other people who live near such plants that I know personally suffer from autoimmune problems, cancers and much more.

In addition, we have this huge opportunity cost of taking money from badly-needed public health, education, infrastructure, law enforcement and much more, and basically we're investing in an industry that's losing it's market capitalization.

So I just encourage the Board in the future to consider really getting behind a new economy for Louisiana and supporting renewable energy, such as the solar program that you have up next on your agenda.

Thank you for this opportunity.

MR. JONES: Thank you, sir.



Any other comments limited solely to the 1 2 issue of whether we should consider the application? 3 MR. BRIGGS: May I say something? 4 MR. JONES: Yes, sir, Mr. Briggs. 5 MR. BRIGGS: I just want to say that this is 6 truly one of those projects that our state's being blessed with that we're able to have here in Louisiana, 7 8 and it's a very important project. So much has been 9 written on it. I've seen so many different things, and 10 I'm just very pleased that we're having this opportunity 11 that we're going to be able to update the Exxon facility 12 so that it's more competitive, it creates jobs, it 13 creates revenues for our schools and our state. 14 Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Briggs. 15 MR. JONES: 16 Since we've not had a single comment on the 17 issue of whether the motion is appropriate or not, I'm 18 going to call for a question on the issue unless someone 19 has an objection. 20 DR. 3	MS. VILLA: Chairman Jones, I believe the
4	application has to be read into the record. I don't
5	believe staff has done that yet.
6	MR. JONES: Okay. Can we have a staff
7	member do that for me, please?
8	MS. VILLA: Yes. I have staff on.
9	MR. USIE: 20200425, ExxonMobil Corporation,
10	East Baton Rouge Parish.
11	MR. JONES: Excellent.
12	Now we're ready for the Exxon rep; right?
13	MS. CHENG: Correct.
14	MR. JONES: Great. All right.
15	MS. MONCADA: Hello. This is Gloria
16	Moncada, ExxonMobil Baton Rouge Refinery Manager. Are
17	you ready for me to speak?
18	MR. JONES: Yes, ma'am, we are. Thank you
19	for working with us.
20	MS. MONCADA: Thank you. Thank you, Board,
21	for putting us on the agenda. I also want to thank LED
22	Secretary Don Pierson, Governor Edwards, Mayor Broome
23	and everyone that has been working with us so diligently
24	the past two years to attract the Baton Rouge Refinery
25	Integrated Competitiveness Initiative, or BRRIC, here to



Louisiana.

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ExxonMobil will make the final go/no-go investment decision for BRRIC in late March. The state's ITEP incentive offer is an important factor that will weigh into our final investment decision. This project is certainly not a guarantee, especially in this current economic environment where deep capital cuts have been announced across the industry, and we've seen thousands of construction jobs lost because the capital spend is not there.

BRRIC is foundational. That's our acronym for the project is BRRIC. It's foundational to the future of our refinery and to the integrated chemical facilities. It's imperative that we strengthen the competitiveness of this refinery so we can better withstand the tough economic conditions like the one we're in now.

Building resiliency into the plant allows us to continue to economically operate the full capacity of the plant. This project suite increases our competitiveness by adding new facilities and technology to grow flexibility to process a wider variety of cheaper crude slates, and it offsets the location disadvantage that we experience in Louisiana.

We also voluntarily built into the project



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new technology to reduce our VOC emissions by 10 percent. More importantly, this project suite helps us retain hundreds of jobs in Baton Rouge, and when we retain jobs for hundreds of the direct employees that work in our refinery, that means we're always hiring. People spend long careers here, they retire, they enjoy stable pensions, and then we hire to replace behind those retirements. And, in fact, we're hiring right now. We're actively working to bring in 40 new process technicians just this year.

Jobs, both employee and contractor, follow investment and the ongoing work that's afforded by the most competitive sites. Our application shows the qualifying portion of the BRRIC suite of projects as \$240-million. The actual total investment is nearly double that when you add in the full scope of the work associated with the suite. So, in fact, if we really were trying to game our way into adding things that wouldn't qualify, why wouldn't we put that entire actual investment in? We didn't because we only put in what qualified. And this major investment is on top of what we spend year to year in base capital spend. This is not our routine spend. This is a mega investment in our facility, and so the impact, the ripple effect on jobs and the economic benefits is significant.



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remember, when we build up our competitiveness and cost efficiency that is deficient, this project suite better positions not just in refinery, but our integrated chemical facilities that rely on cost-competitive feedstocks made by my refinery. A solid, resilient, competitive refinery will help attract future investment. So it's not just this investment that we are trying to invest. We're trying to build a foundation and building block that then makes us pull the next investments in.

Make no mistake, this is a generational suite of projects for the refinery. It's a foundation that we build on to build a strong future here in Baton Rouge.

So thanks again for fitting us into the agenda today. I will tell you, for two years I fought to bring these projects to an economic point to where we can get here today, and I'm personally committed to making sure this investment is a win for this refinery, for the city and for the state. Thank you.

Seeing none, do we have 1 MR. JONES: 2 another --I have a question. 3 MR. MOLLER: 4 MS. VILLA: Jan has his hand up. I'm sorry. Mr. Moller for Ms. 5 MR. JONES: 6 Moncada. MR. MOLLER: I was wondering if you could --7 8 thank you for your presentation. It was very helpful, but if you could elaborate a little bit on what 9 10 Mr. Bagert said. You know, what makes this investment 11 different from the \$240-million a year that he said you 12 spend on routine upgrades and maintenance? 13 MS. MONCADA: Great question. 14 \$240-million-ish we spend every year, as you said, are more routine activities. This is not a routine 15 16 activity. This is a major, major modernization and 17 addition of new technology, new equipment. That is not 18 what we do in our base day to day. This is a major 19 investment of new facilities, reconfiguring and 20 modernizing and added capability that we do not have 21 today. 22 And could you talk a little bit MR. MOLLER: 23 more about the jobs? You mentioned that you're hiring 24 process technicians, and your application talks about 25 creating full-time job opportunities for 20 operators



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from the North Baton Rouge Industrial Training

Initiative, yet the application also talks about no new
net jobs. Could you be a little bit more specific about
how the job totals work?

MS. MONCADA: Yeah, absolutely. So the way to think of this is they are roughly about 1,300 job positions in the ExxonMobil refinery today, and as I mentioned earlier, we have -- the 1,300 employees will eventually, over time, there's retirement, there's people that move to different states or opportunities and we hire behind that because we fill our job positions. So the project does not add new job positions. What it does do is make sure those job positions continue to be here.

As you see, for example, what we saw when Georgia-Pacific shut down a major production line because it's not economic, you see Shaw Convent shut down when a site or a portion of a site is not economic, you shut those facilities or idle those facilities and you do not keep those job positions. Our intention is to keep our site competitive so we can run the full capacity of the plant and retain all those job positions.

The hiring I mentioned, the 40 process technicians and the North Baton Rouge Industrial



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Training Initiative hirees, they're examples of how we continue to fill job positions as people retire and move in and out of this location. We're making the specific commitment that when we have ripple effect and economic benefit with investment, we want to make sure that we are tying it and it goes into the most underserved members of our community, and our North Baton Rouge Industrial Training initiative is how we are making the specific commitment to hire even more out of that program as part of this project.

Does that explain...

MR. JONES: Looks like we lost Mr. Moller.

Let's give Mr. Moller just a moment. Looks like he may have to log back in.

Any other questions from the Board for Ms. Moncada?

MS. COLA: Hi. This is Yvette Cola. I just want to make sure I understand clearly your explanation, Gloria. From what I understand what you're saying is parts of the business model becomes obsolete in order not to eliminate those jobs, you're using advanced technology to retain jobs, so there's a net zero loss to employees at the facility. Did I understand that correctly?

MS. MONCADA: Yeah. Maybe the best way to



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1	do it is to use a very simplified example. You know,
2	pretend you own a store, and the store, you sell
3	different products. If your cost to make one of the
4	products is becoming too high and you are no longer
5	competitive in making that product, you can choose not
6	to make that product anymore. You may shut that part of
7	your store down and lay off the employees that support
8	that part of the store. What we intend to do is make
9	sure that we don't put ourselves in a position where we
10	have to shut down any part of the store.
11	MR. MOLLER: Thank you. My internet cut
12	out, so I missed some of that, but thank you very much.
13	MR. JONES: Mr. Cola, any further questions?
14	MS. COLA: No. I understand. Thank you.
15	MR. JONES: Mr. Moller, you're back with us.
16	We're sorry we lost you. Any other questions for Ms.
17	Moncada?
18	MR. MOLLER: No. I'm good. Thank you.
19	MR. JONES: Good. Thank you.
20	Any other questions from the Board?
21	(No response.)
22	MR. JONES: Ms. Moncada, thank you for being
23	with us this morning.
24	Are there any other presenters for the
25	ExxonMobil group?



1	MS. VILLA: Yes, we do. We have Jennifer
2	Purpera.
3	MR. JONES: I'm sorry. Oh, Ms. Purpera.
4	Ms. Purpera, do you have some comments for
5	us?
6	MS. PURPERA: Yes. Can you hear me now?
7	MR. JONES: We can hear you now. Please
8	state your name for the record so we have it as part of
9	the for the court reporter.
10	MS. PURPERA: My name is Jennifer Purpera,
11	and I work for ExxonMobil Fuels and Lubricants. And I
12	wanted to elaborate further on the comments that Gloria
13	Moncada mentioned in that we, as ExxonMobil, operate
14	globally. We have operations in countries all around
15	the world, and, similarly, our capital our Global
16	Capital Program assesses projects globally, and
17	incentive programs like the ITEP incentive program here
18	in Louisiana help us make our project here in Baton
19	Rouge more competitive and attractive in that Global
20	Capital Program.
21	It is not a required part of our facility
22	that we put in these investments. These are above and
23	beyond the base, and this is actually going to take us
24	to best in class and industry in a way we process crude
25	here in Baton Rouge.



1	The suite of work under consideration
2	enables the refinery to employ best practices that will
3	extend the life of the plant, as Ms. Moncada mentioned
4	earlier, and through the new technology, that increases
5	our capability to run advantaged domestic crudes.
6	So, for us, the ITEP application is a very
7	important piece of the overall economic analysis that we
8	bring forward to our corporation.
9	MR. JONES: Thank you, Ms. Purpera.
10	Any questions from the Board for Ms.
11	Purpera?
12	(No response.)
13	MR. JONES: Seeing none, are there any other
14	speakers from ExxonMobil?
15	MS. VILLA: I believe the Secretary Pierson
16	has his hand raised to speak.
17	MR. JONES: Oh, I'm sorry, Mr. Pierson. I
18	missed you.
19	SECRETARY PIERSON: Just to be clear, in the
20	waiting room requesting to speak, Mayor Sharon Broome,
21	Baton Rouge Area Chamber President Adam Knapp and
22	Economist Stephen Barnes.
23	I don't have a question for Ms. Purpera. I
24	would also like to be added to that list of folks that
25	will comment when you get to the appropriate point for



us, Mr. Chair.

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MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Pierson. What I would like to do is, I know we have people both pro and con on this application. What I'd like to do now, if there are no more speakers specifically from the applicant, ExxonMobil, what I'd like to do is move to those speaking in favor of the application and in favor of the motion, and then we will move to those who are speaking in opposition to the application and in opposition the motion. Unless the Board sees we ought to do it another way, that's the way I'd like to proceed.

Any objections?

MS. VILLA: Chairman Jones, this is Anne.

MR. JONES: Yes, ma'am.

MS. VILLA: I do have a list from ExxonMobil that they have Dr. Stephen Barnes wanting to speak on behalf of the company, as well as Adam Knapp with Baton Rouge Area Chamber. So if you want to receive those comments now, since those were specific from the applicant, Exxon, we can allow them to speak now.

MR. JONES: I think that's -- I think that's appropriate. I know Mayor Broome has already spoken.

Mayor, if you are still logged in, if you would like to speak or have anything further to add to



1	your comments, feel free to do so.
2	And then we can go to Mr. Knapp or
3	Mr. Barnes, whichever.
4	MS. VILLA: Mayor Broome did raise her hand,
5	so I will allow her to speak now.
6	MR. JONES: Great.
7	MAYOR BROOME: Thank you, once again. I
8	know that I have made comments before, and I just want
9	to make sure that my comments that I spoke early on,
10	which may have been at the wrong position, are certainly
11	recorded in the record, and that is that I am here to
12	support ExxonMobil's Industrial Property Tax
13	application. And so unless you have any additional
14	questions for me, I just want to be on record in
15	support, and I look forward to this investment
16	opportunity moving forward.
17	Thank you.
18	MR. JONES: Thank you, Mayor Broome.
19	Any questions from the Board for Mayor
20	Broome?
21	(No response.)
22	MR. JONES: Seeing none, Mayor, thank you
23	for joining us this morning.
24	MAYOR BROOME: Thank you.
25	MR. JONES: Next, Mr. Barnes or Mr. Knapp.



1 MS. VILLA: I have Mr. Knapp.

MR. JONES: Mr. Knapp, thank you for joining

us.

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MR. KNAPP: Thank you, members, for allowing us to speak. I want to share with you on behalf of the Baton Rouge business community our very strong support for the investment we are pursuing from ExxonMobil Corporation for Baton Rouge, and we would ask you to vote to approve their application today.

The outpouring of support we've seen from the Governor, from what you just heard, the Mayor-President, and many small and large businesses throughout the community since Exxon announced their intent has been nothing short of overwhelming and compelling to see that our community truly views the competition for Exxon's modernization investment as an existential project for the long-term sustainability of their jobs in Baton Rouge.

I want to just hit a few high points, and you've heard of some of these already. We will not secure the investment if the community and the state don't provide this inducement to attract this investment, and there still is no guarantee we will secure the project even if the incentive is offered. Therefore, we think it's clearly a competitive



investment, and yet we still haven't won it. We still have some work to do even in working through this process of approval, as the company does as well.

We're also aware today that refineries that are not modernized have been doubly in jeopardy during the pandemic's global downturn. We've seen that Shell in Convent laid off 700 employees last year. We've seen pullbacks from other refineries at Delek and at Calcasieu Refinery and others across the state. We've also seen that Texas has secured this same kind of modernization project that Exxon is considering to make here at both of its comparable refineries to the Baton Rouge Complex, but it has not been made here, and it puts them at a competitive advantage over Baton Rouge until we're able to do so.

We're also aware that pipelines in the Western part of Texas are closer to the East Texas refineries than Baton Rouge, and creates some cost advantages to the compounds in Texas over Louisiana. We've heard this a moment ago, the company is expecting to invest over \$500-million. Only about a little less than half of that is what's going to be a part of its ITEP application. Which we've also seen this over the last few years, the remainder is going to be immediately a part of the property tax base at full millage rate and



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not subject to the ITEP, which gives us a lot of advantages from this from a tax perspective should they choose to make the investment.

We also will see a stimulus effect to this local economy that can help accelerate us out of the pandemic recession. This construction, if we're able to win, it will start this year, 2021, helping to boost industrial construction and service jobs as well as what we're seeing across our community from other companies.

We will not be able to secure the sales and property tax investment from this project that are going benefit our schools and parish government if we don't encourage this project to occur by use of the ITEP.

That could be as much as 5-million in sales taxes immediately to the state and the parish if they choose to go forward.

We want to also point out that what you heard from Ms. Moncada, BRRIC, the name of the project, is meaningful. It's a building block, like a brick. The figurative idea of this is that it's going to make Baton Rouge more competitive for future investments. And the counter is also true that Baton Rouge will be less competitive for future jobs and future investments if we don't secure this modernization investment. Like I said, that's already been done in Texas.



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Because it's an integrated competitive investment, the "I" and the "C" at the end of their acronym stand for Integrated Competitiveness, and it also makes other parts of the refinery more competitive for investment, such as the chemical plant, not just the refinery aspect of it as well.

And just to reiterate what you've heard from the benefits, 20 new jobs for North Baton Rouge residents as part of the training initiative, a 10 percent reduction in volatile organic compound emissions that will come as part of this project and expands the capability of their dock site in North Baton for larger marine cargos to boost Louisiana's exports.

BRAC and MetroMorphosis, a North Baton Rouge group, has also been working with Exxon for our Baton Rouge procurement opportunity partnership to help small, diverse suppliers compete for more and more investment in projects through Exxon. So we're excited to see if this project has an opportunity, and we would ask for your support.

MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Knapp.

And just to be sure the record's clear, that's Mr. Adam Knapp. I did not get him to state his full name for the record, so...

MR. KNAPP: I apologize.



MR. JONES: Any questions from the Board for 1 2 Mr. Knapp? Mr. Jones? 3 MR. NASSAR: 4 MR. JONES: Yes, sir, Mr. Nassar. I don't have any questions for 5 MR. NASSAR: 6 him, but is it appropriate for me to make a comment at 7 this point concerning this? 8 MR. JONES: Yes, you can make it now or you 9 can make it anytime you want to. 10 Okay. Shell Chemical, Shell MR. NASSAR: 11 Oil in Convent continues to come up in this 12 conversation, and just to let the panelists know and the 13 Board know that we are -- I'm from St. James Parish, and 14 just from this facility shutting down, and besides the 15 700 permanent jobs being lost, there's an additional 16 300-and-some-odd jobs being lost, which, in turn, just the St. James Parish School Board, which I am on and 17 18 have been for 26 years, we will lose upwards of 19 \$10-million to our operating budget next year. 20 So when we have to explain to employees and 21 community why services have to be cut, why education 22 programs have to be cut, transportation, you name it, 23 it's very, very hard. I have family members that's been 24 affected by this closure, and I would wish that when we make decisions and consider these exemptions, yes, 25



1	there's always pros and cons to everything, but,
2	economically, I see this as a great, great infusion of
3	money for East Baton Rouge. I see where I mean, just
4	sales and use tax alone on the actual building of it or
5	the addition of the modernization, I just see this as a
6	great, great move for State of Louisiana and in securing
7	the jobs.
8	That's all I have to say. Thank you.
9	MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Nassar.
10	Any other questions for Mr. Knapp?
11	(No response.)
12	MR. JONES: Seeing none, our next speaker,
13	Mr. Barnes.
14	MR. BARNES: Good morning.
15	MR. JONES: Good morning. If you would,
16	state your name and your position for the record,
17	please.
18	MR. BARNES: Stephen Barnes. I'm here
19	representing myself, and I was asked to do an
20	independent assessment of the economic impacts by
21	ExxonMobil to really analyze this project. And I
22	appreciate the opportunity to share those results for
23	your consideration.
24	The construction of the proposed project is
25	estimated to last three years and would generate a total



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of nearly \$740-million in new sales in Louisiana and just over \$290-million in new earnings, including indirect and induced economic effects.

In addition to the construction jobs on site, the proposed investment would help spur additional rounds of spending in the economy as local businesses benefit from additional contracts and workers earned additional pay. So total Louisiana can expect new jobs created of 2,290 in the peak year of construction when we include direct, indirect and induced jobs.

And we've heard some discussion about the employment effects of this project, and so even though this project is not projected to immediately add jobs to the site, I thought it was important to examine the operational impacts because they represent a significant component of this project. And by way of backdrop, the refining industry has experienced a long-run decline in employment nationally, with some larger drops in certain years as individual sites have been shuttered, such as what we've heard about Shell's refinery in Convent.

So this proposed project is expected to help maintain the current level of employment, which is good news compared to a long-run trend that we've seen in this industry of employment declines averaging about a half percent a year over the last 10 years.



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So to look at this, I used that rate of decline as kind of a status quo scenario and compared that to a current employment level scenario to assess the operational impacts, and while the proposed project would have a useful life stretching out many decades and would also position the Baton Rouge refinery, as we've heard, to be more competitive for future investments that might bring with them potential growth, I tried to approach these scenarios in a conservative way and looked out only to 10 years of operational impacts. So in terms of jobs saved, I estimate that the proposed project would retain 84 direct jobs by the end of that 10-year horizon, which would mean a total of upwards of 400 jobs in Louisiana when we include those indirect and induced jobs.

In terms of total sales, those operational impacts over 10 years will have benefitted the state to the tune of \$1.1-billion in additional sales, an additional \$191-million in earnings, as well as tax revenues, not just during the construction period, but thanks to that expended base of operations relative to what I think is a very plausible status quo scenario.

So in looking at those tax implications, during the construction phase, I estimate the state would benefit not just from some direct sales taxes, but



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that broader boost to economic activity would generate an estimated \$19.4-million in total taxes across many other categories of revenue that should see a boost thanks to this uptick in economic activity.

At a parish level, I think construction alone will generate \$6.1-million in sales taxes, but after that project is built, that operational scenario that I examined implies an additional \$15.3-million in state tax revenue over the first 10 years of operations, and \$2.7-million in additional local sales taxes over that 10-year horizon.

Finally, thinking about the property tax effects of this, the construction of this project would add about \$230-million to the tax rolls, which would, even after accounting for the proposed ITEP incentive, would generate an additional \$21.8-million when we look out over, say, 20 years, but even more realistically, when we think about useful life of a big investment like this over a 40-year horizon would add \$43.4-million in property tax revenue for local government.

MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Barnes.

Any questions from the Board for Mr. Barnes?

MR. MOLLER: I -- (internet disconnection.)

MR. JONES: Did I hear someone?

MS. VILLA: Mr. Moller has a question.



MR. JONES: Great. Mr. Moller. 1 2 MS. VILLA: He lost --3 MR. JONES: I don't see -- oh, there you 4 are. I'm sorry. Go right ahead, Mr. Moller. 5 6 MS. VILLA: I think he's coming back. Ι 7 think he's losing connection in and out, so I think he 8 may be coming back on. 9 MR. JONES: Okay. While we wait for 10 Mr. Moller, any other questions from the Board for Mr. 11 Barnes? 12 MR. HOLLEY: Yes. This is Travis Holley. Ι 13 have a question for Mr. Barnes. 14 Yes, sir, Mr. Holley. MR. JONES: MR. HOLLEY: Mr. Barnes, is this report that 15 16 you've prepared available to this Board or to LED or both? 17 18 MR. BARNES: We can certainly make that 19 I know that a summary, I think, had been 20 pushed out and released publically by Exxon, but I know 21 we'd be happy to provide additional detail and followup 22 for you. 23 MR. HOLLEY: Thank you. I'd appreciate 24 that. 25 That's all I have.



1	MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Holley.
2	MR. JONES: I don't see Mr. Moller is back
3	with us yet.
4	Any other questions from the Board?
5	(No response.)
6	MR. JONES: Mr. Barnes, if you don't mind,
7	if you could just stand by, Mr. Moller, when he can join
8	back with us, he may have another question for you. Is
9	that all right?
10	MR. BARNES: That is not a problem at all.
11	MR. JONES: Thank you very much. I
12	appreciate you accommodating us.
13	MS. VILLA: I'm sorry, Chairman Jones.
14	Could you repeat what you just said? We missed that.
15	MR. JONES: I'm sorry, Ms. Villa. I could
16	not hear you.
17	MS. VILLA: I'm sorry. We couldn't hear
18	what you stated before you were looking for Mr. Moller.
19	So he hasn't returned yet. We missed what you said you
20	were going to do next.
21	MR. JONES: Okay. What I was saying is if
22	Mr. Barnes could just stand by, and then when Mr. Moller
23	is able to return, then he may be able to ask his
24	questions.
25	I think Secretary Pierson wanted to speak.



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1 MS. VILLA: It looks like he just -- Jan 2 just joined again, so --

MR. MOLLER: I apologize. I'm all having all kinds of internet problems today.

MR. JONES: No worries. Mr. Moller, I think you had some questions for Mr. Barnes.

MR. MOLLER: Yeah. Mr. Barnes, I guess my whole -- my main question is whether your analysis considered the idea of whether this investment would happen but for the \$20-plus-million in tax forgiveness that is the question for this Board?

MR. BARNES: Despite being asked by
ExxonMobil to do this study, you know, there's a lot of
private information about, you know, what are all of the
other investment decisions the company might be
weighing, so that is kind of an area that was beyond,
you know, the type of analysis that I was looking to
conduct, and I didn't have the type of information to
really offer any additional insight on that. So I
think, just to be clear, you know, what I really wanted
to do is make sure that we could see what the broader
economic benefits would be, would that looks like in
terms of jobs should this go forward, and also to make
sure you-all had some insights in terms of what the net
tax revenues look like if this is approved and the



project does, in fact, proceed. 1 2 MR. MOLLER: Okay. I mean, and I understand that may be an unanswerable question, but I want to, as 3 4 much as possible, understand what -- because I think everybody agrees that this is a -- you know, having 5 6 investment is better than not having investment, but the 7 question for us is whether this investment would happen 8 were it not for this incentive that we're asked to 9 approve. 10 MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Moller. 11 MR. MOLLER: That's my only question. 12 MR. JONES: Great. Thank you. Thank you 13 very much. 14 Mr. Barnes, thank you. Any other questions for Mr. Barnes before we 15 16 let him go? 17 (No response.) 18 Thank you, Mr. Barnes. MR. JONES: 19 Mr. Pierson, I think you wanted to speak. 20 SECRETARY PIERSON: Yes. Thank you, Mr. 21 Chairman, and thank you for the opportunity to address 22 the Board here today. I'll try not to replow the ground 23 that has very eloquently been put forward from Exxon and from Dr. Barnes. 24 25 A couple things that I would like to do, and



number one would be to express our support from LED and the support of Governor John Bel Edwards for this potential ExxonMobil investment here in Baton Rouge. From the Governor's viewpoint, he'll state for the record that ExxonMobil has operated in Baton Rouge for more an 110 years and has provided high-quality jobs for decades at their integrated refinery and chemical complex. This project demonstrates that ExxonMobil has confidence in the future of Louisiana and in our outstanding workforce here, and Louisiana is committed to working with ExxonMobil to make this investment happen. So we are also as supportive as we can be from and LED perspective and understanding the translation of what Dr. Barnes has communicated.

The other point that I would simply like to make is I hope the dialog that has happened here thus far addresses some of the concerns expressed earlier in this conversation by Mr. Bagert. Number one, and this is also for Jan Moller as well, we believe this is a competitive situation with Texas. We believe that Exxon will shed jobs. We want them to shed jobs in Texas, not in Louisiana. So we will, as part of this program, given that it also receives support at the local level, have contracts in place such that we will audit the jobs to be sure that they are retained and if it felt like



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there might be some question about accountability, but these contracts are monitored each year for these employment numbers, and that includes that these are Louisiana residents, and our Board of Communities sometimes will pick up workers from Arkansas, Texas or Mississippi don't qualify.

And, finally, you heard very specifically that this project is much larger than the exemption being requested here. It was carefully considered that this is not their annual maintenance budget. This is not even all the things that are going into supporting the project, the BRRIC project that Adam Knapp outlined. This is the part of that that would specifically meet the qualifications necessary to be exempt on the tax rolls.

So there's a lot of scrutiny here. We welcome that because we're transparent with the process, but we make a great case for something that's important to the future economy of not only the capital region, but of Louisiana as well.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Pierson.

Do we have any other comments from the public in favor of the project? Any participants on the meeting that would like to speak in favor of the



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1	project?
2	MS. VILLA: We have a hand up no. It
3	went down. Sorry. It came up again. I have a and
4	it just went down again.
5	Okay. No we don't. The number that the
6	panelists may see, the Board members may see, the
7	915-505 number, that's our pass code, so I'm not certain
8	why that's showing up, but I'll try to allow it to talk,
9	but I don't know that anyone's going to be there, but
10	just so that we can show everyone that we've done that.
11	MR. JONES: Then at this time, the Chair
12	would entertain comments from the public in opposition
13	to the application.
14	MS. VILLA: We do have someone who just
15	raised their hand, Joel Waltzer.
16	MR. JONES: Okay.
17	MR. WALTZER: Hello. Can you hear me?
18	MR. JONES: Mr. Waltzer, yes, sir.
19	MR. WALTZER: Hi. My name is Joel Waltzer.
20	I'm in New Orleans, Louisiana. I've testified before
21	you guys before or even shared my opinion with you
22	before. I'm here today both individually and as
23	representative for Together Louisiana.
24	I wanted to share a few of the process



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concerns that I have that are continuing. I do note

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that you have been given a much more comprehensive set of facts and much more testimony in this instance, but I wanted to share this with you, and hopefully, you know, you consider whether or not you're going to require more even or you're going to require at least this minimal showing every time moving forward when you're making these decisions.

The Constitution obviously authorizes you, with the approval of the Governor, to enter into ITEP contracts with manufacturers. It is not an unlimited authorization, and it comes with significant constraints. You can only grant, as you know, applications for new manufacturing facilities or additions that meet the definition. You also -- the ITEP application also has to meet the purpose of the program and is on balancing the best interest of the state and will not be gratuitously undertaken. Right?

So, you know, to properly discharge this, you've made regulations, and, you know, my concern continues to be that we're not following the procedural requirements that are required when you're approving and considering these and that basically LED isn't supporting views like they should in terms of creating a record.

So you have an independent duty as a



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committee member to discharge your fiduciary duty to the public, and you need to make sure that this application and the application that follows, so my comments are going to veer to both, if you don't mind, meet the following conditions.

If the documents you are provided do not demonstrate the proposed facility involves a manufacturing operation, then the application must be rejected. I don't think we have a problem in this instance.

If the applicant does not demonstrate that the project will create new, permanent jobs and the documents you were given lack evidence of a, quote, "compelling reason for the retention of existing jobs," then approving the application would violate your purpose of your own rules, and I do have a concern specifically as it relates to that, which is in your own rules in Section 50 -- I'm sorry -- 503(F), you know, basically your rules require that, you know, that a company establish that it's going to create new, permanent jobs. And it says in 503(F)(2) when you're not creating new, permanent jobs, you need a, quote, "compelling reason."

And the rule goes on to state a number of factors that may be considered by you to determine



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whether or not it's compelling. Factor (F) states "Upon the sharing of financial information as to the profit/loss of the facility accompanied by evidence that the exemption will prolong the life of, and employment at, the establishment."

We heard some testimony today from the Exxon employees that that often doesn't happen in terms of extending the life of the facility, but we have heard nothing from LED to suggest that the financial information, which would really go to Mr. Moller's concern, about whether this -- you know, there is a but for relationship, whether the financial -- whether Exxon has shared the financial information necessary with LED for LED to analyze and then recommend to you that, yes, indeed, this is not a gratuitous, they need the exemption, it is part of a competitive package.

And so I have a concern that, while you have been shared information, the rules require a specific sharing of information between yourself and the applicant, and because LED basically assists and administers the program, I would assume that would be discharged through LED. I don't see that that's happened. Maybe Mr. Pierson, Secretary Pierson can answer that concern.

We also -- you know, they spoke to the



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environmental, the VOC emission reductions. You know, one of the requirements that you have is that you have evidence in the record that's going assure you that any environmental upgrade was not done as required per the applicant to meet its legal obligation to regulators. I understood that it was voluntarily done, but I don't know that -- you know, I would be concerned that, you know, LED or whomever, you know, is analyzing these and fact checking these, you know, that they would have assured themselves maybe by contacting DEQ. And, again, I don't know if that was done.

If you cannot determine from the record before you that the applicant is performing simply ordinary maintenance or replacing existing machines or undertaking a substantial renovation, then you must deny the application. If there is no evidence for you to consider that an ITE was a material factor in the decision to construct or expand, then granting the exemption is a prohibited gift under the Constitution.

And in every case, LED -- and this is my biggest concern that I'm sharing with you today. LED is administering the ITEP. It is your supporting agency. You know, as your supporting agency, LED has to provide you with an evidentiary record for you to consider in advance of this decision. You know, what your own call,



which you're in, according to our own rules, LED has to provide you with the Secretary's statement of a return on investment document. Right? And I believe that the LED also has to provide you with independent proposed findings of fact and the reasons for decision.

So each of you are sitting on the Board as fiduciaries with an obligation to the public. The Constitution requires evidence to show that you discharged your due diligence obligation in good faith in each instance, and that includes adopting a written findings of fact and the reasons for decision in each of the applications before you.

This comment goes maybe -- it is specifically given toward the Exxon application and then the following application on the solar farm, but I have a continuing objection regarding decisions that are made on an impartial record or an incomplete record, that LED is not properly discharged being a support function to you as fiduciaries, as Board members. Right? Just like if you were a Board member on a private nonprofit, you would be requiring the head of the private nonprofit to provide you with financials to assure that you are discharging your obligation as Board members. We believe the same thing holds here as well, that LED has to be providing you with a record of decision, with the



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information, with the documents that are independently verified by LED that support the application.

We have heard a more robust discussion here than we hear on most, you know, but we believe that it is appropriate for the Board to ask that of LED, your supporting agency, and the public, simply put, deserves an explanation as to why the applicant's taxes should be excused while they are asked to pay, while the public still has to pay property taxes, even in such times as this.

We believe the Constitution requires at least this minimum level of basic accountability and transparency, and we ask that your Board, in the decisionmaking process, and LED, in its role as your support, come under the compliance with the Constitution.

Thank you.

MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Waltzer.

MR. WALTZER: Chairman, I have a letter that has basically what I've told you and it has legal citations in it, and I didn't want to bother you with reading the names of cases and provisions. If you don't mind, will you accept this letter into the record in supplement of my testimony?

MR. JONES: Yes, we will. Will you submit



that to LED by e-mail? 1 2 Yes, sir. MR. WALTZER: If you would submit it to LED, 3 MR. JONES: and LED can turn around and get it to the Board members. 4 I would specifically ask 5 MR. WALTZER: 6 Mr. -- is it a Dr. Pierson or Mr.? I'm sorry -- to 7 answer the concern that the documents, such as the 8 economist's report and other things are not showing up in the record of the decision being put in front of the 9 10 Board. 11 I'm sorry. I didn't understand MR. JONES: 12 what you're asking. 13 MR. WALTZER: I'm sorry. I would ask that 14 Dr. Pierson address, you know, basically what I -- and 15 I'm not -- you know, I'm not being judgmental, but LED's 16 failure to put in the return on investment document and 17 the economist's support and other evidence showing that 18 LED has essentially cut the cards and fact checked the 19 applicant into the record that is under consideration by 20 the Board. 21 MR. JONES: I will leave that to 22 Mr. Pierson. 23 Thank you, Mr. Waltzer. MR. WALTZER: 24 Thank you very much. 25 MR. JONES: Any questions from the Board for

18	I'm Carl Spears with Upstream Petroleum
19	located right on the river here in Baton Rouge. I am in
20	support of that. The equipment was not working. I do
21	apologize for that. I'm in support of this investment,
22	but I do want to say that as fiduciaries of the
23	information of LED, we ask that you please oversight
24	what you are approving to make sure that we, as Baton
25	Rougians and the State of Louisiana can compete on the



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global competitiveness. We ask that you please monitor this investment, make sure that the tax dollars, the educational dollars, all of the dollars that the Metro board has asked to be approved. You are the leaders of this in Baton Rouge, and we would like the make sure that this is a grand benefit, a grand opportunity that Louisiana has to do this.

And as an industry in the industry that I've been in, I did work for Turner, I worked for performance as a fuel planner, I'm very well abreast of what goes on in the market, and we do not want to see just maintenance on projects that's going on that's going to be given over to the subcontractors and contractors. want the permanent jobs that this opportunity can bring to so many people and for the disadvantage of Baton Rouge and, of course, the HUD zone that we are in. And we would like to know that can -- what guarantee can Exxon give us that the lower economic community to actually benefit and actually can be seen, a visual area of the community that Exxon has an obligation to know and to present to the record on the record that this is what we are doing, what we has (sic) done and what we will continue to do, and we ask that LED make sure that that happens.

MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Spears.

20	Godfrey-Smith. I reside in Gilliam, Louisiana in the
21	northern part of our beautiful state. It is, again, a
22	pleasure to come before you this morning.
23	I am not against this project. I am for the
24	project, but I would like to ask the Board, and I'm not
25	sure who would respond, if you have considered setting



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some parameters for these sorts of forgiveness of taxes as an investment that the people of the State of Louisiana will make in a private industry, ExxonMobil, but what is the exchange for the people of the State of Louisiana other than jobs and things that are not concrete?

I am recommending that you as a body would consider, along with the Louisiana Economic Development Corporation, to require that when these tax forgiveness issues come up, that you would also require that some specific amount, say, arbitrarily for now, for consideration, a 10 percent amount of whatever is gained by Exxon, a 10 percent of that amount that would go into a fund governed, administered by LED to strengthen the small businesses in our state.

There are so many disparities, and that is just one of them, when I heard the proud speaker talk about the, I'll call it, the lower echelon of whether it's business, wherever it is.

Numbers, we have to see that something has to be done across the board to improve our state in so many places and areas. And I'm going to ask you to consider, if it's not possible with this, in the future, to set aside an amount from what they are gaining from off the backs of the citizens of the State of Louisiana.



1	Ten percent sounds very reasonable, \$230,000 that could
2	be granted to small businesses across our state to help
3	them to survive during these tough economic times.
4	I yield the floor.

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a resident of Slidell, Louisiana. My most recent role has been with the Naval Research Lab as a Computational Scientist at Stennis Space Center. However, the views and comments I speak now do not represent those of the Department of Defense, the US Navy or the United States Government as a direction under the Hawley Act. In this case, I speak in opposition of the matter at hand.

My primary concerns are repeating the necessary fiduciary responsibility towards calculating and producing sufficient and complete reports on the return on investment potentiality for the State of Louisiana and Baton Rouge district.

My primary concerns are with the declining opportunity and market saturation of fossil fuel and refinery processes that are being proposed of the refinery and the anticipating proposed suggested that the return on investment four-year timeline being a net positive for that long-term duration when there are significant movements at hand currently suggesting various movements towards reduction in emissions that might require certain amounts of streaming assets within the fossil fuel and oil refining industries.

And so in repeating of the earlier comments around the matter of the economic analysis required for passing of such motions, I suggest further checks and



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balances on that report generation towards analyzing the true economic impact that's possible for Louisiana under investing in this particular opportunity. There's this other alternative opportunities for investment that Louisiana may be able to pursue that might provide a greater return on investment than that within ExxonMobil.

Some of my own understandings, though not being an economist in this area, understands that current matters, at least within stock indices and directions of valuations within the fossil fuel industries, such as companies like ExxonMobil, are in general and declined compared to the rest of the standard, say, S&P 500 entities, and definitely renewable energy sectors that are instead making an upward trend in potential opportunities for investment.

Thus, in repeating the same, I encourage a review of that potential return on investment with that particular opportunity in comparison to others to make sure that we are providing the best economic opportunity for the residents of Louisiana rather than sticking with the status quo that might, instead, when we're thinking on four-year timelines, might end up actually being a not as effective use of hard-earned dollars.

4	MR. HOLLEY: Yes. This is Travis Holley. I
5	have a question, if I may ask it, please.
6	MR. JONES: Yes, sir, Mr. Holley. Please
7	do.
8	MR. HOLLEY: Well, it's as much a statement
9	as it is a question. I'm sure that the gentleman
10	understands that our primary purpose is to give tax
11	abatements to those manufacturing corporations that
12	actually create jobs, and as I understand it, there
13	is other than the construction jobs, there's no
14	permanent jobs that are going to be made as a result of
15	this plant being funded and manufacturer put in place.
16	Am I wrong on that?
17	MR. BRISCH: Yes. So there will be a
18	long-term position associated with this project as
19	identified on the application and materials in front of
20	you.
21	MR. HOLLEY: When you say a "long-term
22	position," is that one job?
23	MR. BRISCH: Yes. That will be at least one
24	job, yes. And solar projects don't require much
25	maintenance after they're up and in operation, so it's



very, very typical for a solar project. It's a large 1 2 tax base, produces a lot of tax revenue, but doesn't 3 have very much burden on local resources. 4 MR. HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you, sir. 5 MR. MOLLER: I have one more question --6 MR. JONES: Yes. MR. MOLLE: -- Mr. Chairman, if you --8 MR. JONES: Go right ahead. 9 MR. MOLLER: Same question I asked of Exxon, 10 would this investment happen but for the tax forgiveness 11 that you're asking of this Board? 12 MR. BRISCH: Definitely not. So we produce 13 a commodity, electricity --14 MR. JONES: I'm sorry. Go right ahead. 15 Sorry for the interruption. 16 That's okay. MR. BRISCH: 17 We produce a commodity, electricity, and all 18 of the other traditional power generators in Louisiana, whether it be CLECO, Entergy, or others who get the tax 19 20 In order to compete in a commodity-driven incentive. 21 business, it would be put at a substantial disadvantage 22 without the ITEP tax incentive, and we would not be able 23 to go forward without it. 24 MR. MOLLER: Thank you. 25 MS. COLA: Hi. This is Yvette Cola. I iust



want to -- I understand what you said in terms of there 1 2 Am I correct there? will be a job created. 3 MR. BRISCH: Yes. 4 MS. COLA: Okay. Can you just, for my curiosity, what type of job is being created? 5 6 MR. BRISCH: It is an onsite maintenance 7 position. 8 MS. COLA: Okay. Thank you. 9 To make sure that the project MR. BRISCH: 10 runs properly after the start of operation. 11 MS. COLA: Thank you. 12 MR. HAVARD: I have a question. 13 MR. JONES: Yes, Mr. Havard. 14 MR. HAVARD: What was the locals' opinion on 15 this, did the -- the school board's, et cetera, what did 16 they vote on this decision? 17 MR. BRISCH: They haven't taken a formal 18 vote on this per the ITEP rules yet, but we have been in 19 discussion with the local taxing authorities, and they 20 are supportive of the project. 21 MR. HAVARD: Okay. 22 MR. HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I have one other 23 question, if I may. 24 MR. JONES: Go right ahead. 25 MR. HOLLEY: Sir, would you tell me if you



1	are regulated by the Public Service Commission?
2	MR. BRISCH: The company is not, no, but
3	there may be certain regulations required of the PSC
4	later for the company just when it goes into operation.
5	But at this time, you know, the company is not itself
6	regulated by the PSC, but the PSC regulates the power
7	sector, and so when we go into operation, it will be
8	subject to rules and regulations associated with the
9	power sector.
10	MR. HOLLEY: Well, doesn't the PSC pretty
11	well guarantee you a rate of return on your capital
12	investment?
13	MR. BRISCH: Oh, no. Yeah, we're not
14	Entergy or CLECO. We're an independent power producer.
15	MR. HOLLEY: All right. Thank you.
16	MS. VILLA: Chairman Jones, I do want to
17	recognize that Advantous Consulting has their hand
18	raised, and I did unmute them because they work with the
19	company.
20	MR. JONES: I understand, but we'll get to
21	them as soon as these questions are answered.
22	MS. VILLA: Okay.
23	MR. JONES: Any other questions or comments
24	from the Board for Mr. Brisch?
25	MR. NASSAR: I have one question just for



1	clarification purposes.
2	MR. JONES: Yes, sir.
3	MR. NASSAR: Seems the tax exemption would
4	be \$17,574,000, and that would create one job; correct?
5	The tax exemption is \$17,574,000 and will only create
6	one permanent job; correct?
7	MR. BRISCH: I believe BRAC and Advantous
8	are here to speak on the economics of the tax incentive,
9	but we are producing \$23.5-million in a 20-year local
10	tax revenue from the project. We are producing 10 yeas
11	of local tax revenue in the amount of \$15.4-million. We
12	are producing \$12-million in sales tax in the first two
13	years of the project from this.
14	MR. LEONARD: This is Jimmy Leonard with
15	Advantous. Mr. Chairman, may I have an opportunity to
16	assist my client with some of these questions?
17	MR. JONES: Are you addressing questions
18	that have been asked of the Board already?
19	MR. LEONARD: I will be addressing some of
20	the questions regarding the job on the application as
21	well as the economics as Mr. Nassar has just recently
22	asked.
23	MR. JONES: Okay. Go right ahead.
24	MR. LEONARD: Sure.
25	Mr. Nassar, at this point in time, the



property taxes paid on the property on an annual basis are just under \$5,000. It's \$4,997. Absent this project, that property tax will continue for 10 years and likely net somewhere around \$50,000 in total. With this project moving forward, over that 10-year timeframe, there would be \$15-million in property taxes that would be paid.

So in terms of the highest and best use for that property, a lot of the conversation locally has been there's a very significant economic return on the investment, and there will also, during operations, not be a very significant public service commitment or requirement in order to handle the operational needs of that facility.

In terms of the jobs, there is one permanent job that will be created to perform all of the activities that Board members have very appropriately raised. There is going to be some daily operational, some maintenance and some repair work. The way that project structure is done is that that job will not reside on the payroll of the Willis Pond entity. It would be on the payroll of a third-party entity that would meet the requirements of the ITEP rules and regulations. So in terms of the format and presentation to the Board, it appears as though there's a zero jobs



1	there, but there are three asterisks on the actual
2	agenda, and those three asterisks will note that there
3	is one permanent job, it will just not be in the project
4	entity payroll.
5	MR. NASSAR: Thank you for the
6	clarification.
7	MR. LEONARD: Yes, sir.
8	MR. JONES: Any other questions or comments
9	from the Board to either of the company representatives?
10	(No response.)
11	MR. JONES: Hearing none, any other comments
12	from the company?
13	MR. BRISCH: No, sir.
14	MS. VILLA: I do have a representative from
15	BRAC, Russell Richardson, that is on the company's list
16	to speak.
17	MR. JONES: Okay. Mr. Richardson are you
18	let's give him the opportunity.
19	MR. RICHARDSON: Hey. Can everyone hear me?
20	MR. JONES: Yes. Please state your name and
21	your position and then direct your comments to the
22	Board, please.
23	MR. RICHARDSON: Yes. Thank you. It's
24	Russell Richardson. I'm with the Baton Rouge Area
25	Chamber. We've been working with the company on this



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project. The locals are supportive. It would certainly be a significant windfall in terms of tax revenue to a rural community as well as building our regional capacity towards renewable energy and those types of things. So we're supportive of the project in terms of just, you know, where that tax bill is now with that property. It's around \$5,000. Should this locate there, that increases that first year of property tax, which I think is on the application, to about \$400-plusthousand. So I just want to point that out, but we are supportive of the project.

MR. JONES: Mr. Richardson, I don't know if this question is directed better to you or to the company representatives, but we were throwing the word around "locals" fairly loosely. Specifically what local entities have you-all -- are you basing that?

MR. RICHARDSON: Yeah. So normally when we work with companies on projects in the local parishes in our non-parish region, we work with either the parish council or the police jury, whatever is appropriate. We'll work with the school board and the sheriff, the public officials, the taxing entities that we communicate to in terms of the projects.

MR. JONES: And so can I interpret your remarks then that you have spoken with those -- and what



1	parish are we in? I'm sorry. I should know that.
2	MR. RICHARDSON: This is East Feliciana
3	Parish.
4	MR. JONES: Okay. And you have spoken with
5	those representatives from East Feliciana?
6	MR. RICHARDSON: Yes. Our point project
7	manager, Jayson Newell, he was unable to be here today,
8	so I'm filling in for him, but Jayson has been in touch
9	with the parish on the project, he has been
10	communicating, along with the company.
11	MR. JONES: Okay. The parish as well as the
12	sheriff and the school board?
13	MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.
14	MR. JONES: Okay. Thank you.
15	MR. RICHARDSON: Yes, sir. Thank you.
16	MR. JONES: Any other questions or comments
17	from the Board to any of the company representatives?
18	MS. COLA: Just a point of clarification.
19	I'm Yvette Cola, again.
20	MR. JONES: Yes, Ms. Cola.
21	MS. COLA: While you say that you've been in
22	contact with those individuals, that means that they
23	lend their support to this project?
24	MR. RICHARDSON: Yes. That's part of the
25	process when we work projects. We're generally kind of



1	the go-between from the state to the local parishes
2	working through the taxing entities on the ITEPs.
3	MR. JONES: Any other questions or comments
4	from the Board?
5	MS. VILLA: Yes, we do have a Board member
6	who has a question. His hand raised. Les Farnum.
7	MR. JONES: Yes, sir, Mr. Farnum.
8	MR. FARNUM: Yes, sir. What is the life
9	expectancy of a solar panel in one of these fields?
10	MR. BRISCH: The module manufacturers
11	indicate a 40-year useful life for a solar panel. I,
12	however, may want to replace those before that time
13	period given technological advancements in solar
14	modules.
15	MR. FARNUM: So I guess my question is, is
16	at the end of the five or 10-year exemption period,
17	however that works out, would you be back at the table
18	trying to extend that in any way? Because it'd be a
19	very significant windfall for the local economy with
20	taxes for this exemption to run out and then you pay the
21	tax rate.
22	MR. BRISCH: Yes, we are planning to pay
23	the full tax rate at the end of the exemption period.
24	MR. FARNUM: So your business model reflects
25	that, and there wouldn't be any kind of extension



1	request?
2	MR. BRISCH: After the 10 years, no.
3	MR. FARNUM: Thank you.
4	MR. JONES: Any other questions or comments
5	from the Board?
6	MR. HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I have a question
7	procedurally to ask of you.
8	MR. JONES: Yes, sir.
9	MR. HOLLEY: If now is the time, if you can
10	take it now.
11	MR. JONES: Go right ahead.
12	MR. HOLLEY: The word of the local governing
13	bodies being for this project makes me concerned as to
14	whether or not I understand that if we act favorably on
15	this application today whether a formal presentation
16	will be made to the local governing authorities and
17	their input given back to us.
18	MR. JONES: Yes. Actually the process is
19	that once the Board of Commerce and Industry approves
20	this application, it has no meaning to the company
21	unless and until they go to the local parish
22	representatives and actually receive resolutions in
23	support. And so this today is an exercise to say that
24	they have met the state requirements for the ITEP
25	application, but, actually, it's implementation will be



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1	dependent upon the approval from the locals.
2	MR. HOLLEY: That's what I thought, and I
3	thank you for the clarification.
4	MR. JONES: Sure.
5	Any other questions or comments from the
6	Board?
7	(No response.)
8	MR. JONES: Seeing none, are there any other
9	comments in favor of the application from the
10	participants?
11	MS. VILLA: Currently, no. Everyone that
12	was on their list has addressed the Board.
13	MR. JONES: Okay. Do we have any any who
14	wish to speak in opposition to the application?
15	MS. VILLA: I do have a hand raised well,
16	it just went down by Mr. Carl Spears, but his hand
17	just went down.
18	MR. JONES: Okay.
19	MS. VILLA: But as of right now, we have no
20	other hand raised from the attendees.
21	MR. JONES: All right. I will assume then
22	we are ready to vote. The motion is to approve the
23	application. Can we have a rollcall vote, please?
24	MS. SIMMONS: Don Briggs.
25	MR. JONES: Mr. Briggs, could you vote on



1	the Willis Pond application, please?
2	MR. BRIGGS: I'm sorry. Yes.

24	requests: ChampionX, LLC, 20160707, ChampionX is			



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retaining \$73,338 in assets, Nalco Production, LLC is

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receiving \$4,453,676 in assets, and this is in St. John the Baptist Parish.

ChampionX, LLC, 20160726, ChampionX is retaining \$1,254,967, Nalco Production, LLC is receiving \$3,323,535, and this is in St. John the Baptist Parish.

ChampionX, LLC 20160768, ChampionX, LLC is retaining \$490,000, Nalco Production, LLC is receiving \$2,683,574, and this is in St. John the Baptist Parish.

MR. JONES: Thank you, sir.

These three partial transfer of ownership interest are being considered as matters critical to continuation of the business of the Board and are not able to be postponed due to a deadline that cannot be postponed by the Board. And that's pursuant to the provisions of Revised Statute 42.17.1(A)(2)(c). It, therefore, does not require a two-thirds vote for consideration. These three are pre-Executive Order projects that are up for renewal that the company needs to be considered before April the 1st, which is some tax deadlines. It has to file its tax information with the local assessor by that date.

However, the transfer of ownership needs to occur before the renewal consideration, so we are doing the transfer -- we're considering the transfers today, and then presumably we'll consider the renewal



1	consideration at the February meeting. That's the
2	reason we're the timing of this requires
3	consideration at this meeting.
4	So we've had the presentation from Mr. Usie.
5	I would entertain a motion to approve these partial
6	transfers of ownership.
7	I have a motion from Ms. Malone; second from
8	Mr. Nassar.
9	Do we have anyone from the company present
10	to speak?
11	MS. VILLA: I have a hand raised by Richard
12	Griffin.
13	MR. JONES: Mr. Griffin.
14	MR. GRIFFIN: Good morning. How are y'all?
15	MR. JONES: Great, Mr. Griffin. Please
16	state your name and address any comments to the Board,
17	please.
18	MR. GRIFFIN: Richard Griffin is my name,
19	and I work for DMA. We work for Nalco and ChampionX,
20	and we were tasked with getting these partial transfers
21	completed. The companies have just had they went
22	through, I guess a name change and then a transfer of
23	ownership to spin off their some of their oil
24	chemical processing away from their water treatment
25	processing or water treatment chemical manufacturing,



1	and so that's what we're doing here is we're separating
2	the water treatment chemical manufacturing company from
3	the oil chemicals manufacturing company.
4	MR. JONES: Thank you.
5	MR. GRIFFIN: If you have any questions
6	about the
7	MR. JONES: And you're needing to get these
8	matters in place prior to submitting applications to the
9	tax assessor on April 1st?
10	MR. GRIFFIN: Yes, sir. That way we can get
11	them in the right names and we can get the renewals done
12	for partial transfers. We filed for the renewals from
13	the original account, but we can't file for the renewal
14	for the partial transfer until we have the partial
15	transfer account set up, if that makes sense.
16	MR. JONES: I understand. I understand.
17	All right. Any questions or comments from
18	the Board to Mr. Griffin?
19	(No response.)
20	MR. JONES: Seeing none, are there any
21	other any other those who want to speak in favor of
22	the application or applications?
23	MS. VILLA: There is no hands raised and
24	there have been no e-mail.
25	MR. JONES: All right. Does anyone want to



1	speak in opposition to the applications?				
2	MS. VILLA: There are no hands raised and we				
3	received no e-mails.				
4	MR. JONES: All right. So I presume we are				
5	ready to vote. The motion is to approve all three

Thank you to all of our Board members here today for making the time, not just the time that has been reflected on the screens, but also you've all received comprehensive information in advance of the Board meeting to help prepare you for those important votes that you make.

I was noting, and Mr. Joe Waltzer's comments, and certainly appreciate his opinion and concern. We look forward to receiving his letter, but we also look forward to responding to his letter because a number of the comments that he made were incomplete, just, for example, the notion that you cannot approve for a no net new job application. The rules clearly provide for retention, which is critically important to us as these plant modernize and remain competitive. And it's not just these plants. It's all types of industry that are impacted by technology. I think Ms. Cola was making that point at one point in our discussions. So we'll address that and clean things up and help them



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gain a better understanding.

I certainly know that the approach sometimes is you don't know what you don't know, and I think that there's a lack of understanding of the depth that LED and how seriously we take our role in administering this program for this Board, for our elected officials, for the Governor and that we're under the scrutiny of the legislative auditor, and we strive very hard to do these things correctly.

It's a very challenging time for us in Louisiana. As you know, our economy is under a great deal of stress. Certainly a large share of that COVID-related, the pandemic, unprecedented times for all of us, and then to layer on the very challenging storms that have impacted our state, the devastation in Southwest Louisiana and the important rebuild that we're seeking to support there with the federal resources with bringing the SBA opportunities to our small businesses across the state and so many other things.

Despite that, I am pleased to report that we had an excellent 2020. Didn't get a lot of notice, we wouldn't expect that, but notice was appropriately on public health. And as the Governor stated, balancing this very large public health threat with still trying to maintain the economy and balance those critical



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issues, and so that's where we have found ourselves.

But in that environment, we were still able to secure 58 project wins totaling more than \$12.7-billion in committed investments for us, and I'm also pleased that that occurred across 28 parishes in our state. Certainly a lot of focus on our small businesses and a lot of focus on our rural communities is a big feature of what we do at Louisiana Economic Development right now.

We also know that there's stress and concern relative to our oil and gas industry. Hey, we are an energy state, and we recognize that oil and gas activities power our state's economy and they're going to power America's recovery going forward. So we will do all the things that we can to maintain our strength and also begin that strength in the other sectors of energy, such as wind power, such as solar power, as you've seen here today, and the renewables that we're also a significant player in. We grow more trees than we harvest. We have a net positive gain in our state relative to wood fiber, and we're doing a lot of things that are value add related to that.

So with that, with a new initiative in carbon capture, we're going to be leaders not only in energy, but also in contributing to a better environment



1	and activities going forward, and you'll see that
2	reflected.
3	I don't want to take more of your time,
4	we've been afforded that today and greatly appreciate
5	that. And those are the balance of my comments. I'll
6	yield now back to our Chairman.
7	MR. JONES: Thank you, Mr. Pierson, and
8	congratulations. I know you guys have been active in a
9	year when it was difficult to be active due to the
10	constraints of the pandemic, but we thank you for your
11	efforts and those of your staff and those that are
12	willing to invest in Louisiana. So those are exciting
13	things.
14	Anything else from the Board, anything else
15	for the good of the order?
16	(No response.)
17	MR. JONES: If not, I entertain a motion to
18	adjourn.
19	We have a motion from Dr. Wilson; second
20	from Mr. Slone.
21	All in favor, say "aye."
22	(Several members respond "aye.")
23	MR. JONES: I'm not going to force a
