13 MS. BARON:

14 Mr. Chairman, we have a quorum.

15 MR. FLOYD:

16 Do we have any public comments?

17 MS. BARON:

18 No, sir. We do not.

19 MR. FLOYD:

20 All right. Adoption and approval of
21 the previous minutes from the last meeting?

22 MR. BRITT:

23 I make a motion.

24 MR. BROWN:

25 Second.

1 MR. FLOYD:

2 I have a motion and a second.

3 Item for financial matters.

4 MR. KRAUS:

5 Good morning. My name is Drew Kraus.

6 I am a CPA with TWRU-CPAs and we conducted the
7 financial statement audit for the fiscal year
8 that ended 6/30/23. I put a copy of both the
9 Financial Statement Audit and the Statewide
10 Agreed Upon Procedures Engagement which we
11 conducted in front of you.

12 I am just going to kind of good over
13 the highlights. I also included my card if you
14 have any further questions, please feel free to
15 reach out.

16 That was a clean or unmodified audit
17 opinion. As usual, Derek and his staff did an
18 excellent job keeping the books for y'all.
19 Y'all had a net income of approximately \$59,000
20 last year. And I wanted to point out that
21 there -- most of that came from nonoperating
22 revenue. Your investments did exceptionally
23 well because of interest rates last year were
24 exceedingly high as I am sure everyone can
25 attest. So just keep that going. Keep that in

1 mind going forward when you start getting into
2 your budget in the next few months.

3 We also had your cash position was
4 essentially the same as the previous year at
5 over \$2 million. Y'all are sitting very well
6 with your cash. We also need to keep in mind
7 FDIC limits and your pledged securities.
8 Whenever y'all are going forward, the State
9 requires you to have collateral or insurance to
10 cover all of your cash deposits and y'all are
11 getting close to the limit between your --
12 between your FDIC insurance and your pledged
13 securities that y'all have at -- I think it was
14 at New York Bank, which is typical for
15 government agencies. So just keep that in
16 mind.

17 We did have one finding. If you turn
18 towards the end of the audit report and it was
19 dealing with your budget. According to State
20 law, you are only allowed a 10 percent
21 variance, or something to that effect, between
22 your budget and your actual end-of-year
23 numbers. And y'all had some larger differences
24 than that.

25 Usually what I recommend to clients,

1 especially ones that meet as often as you do,
2 is in May and/or June, revisit the budget to
3 make sure it is going to line up with your
4 actual numbers as of 6/30. That way you can
5 amend the budget without any issue and your
6 numbers are going to pretty much coincide with
7 your end-of-fiscal year numbers. That way you
8 won't find this on your report again.

9 We also had the SAP report, which is
10 the smaller packet that you have. And we only
11 had one finding. It dealt with bank
12 reconciliations. Just the dates weren't within
13 two months which are required by the State.

14 So these are the only things that we
15 had. They were very, very minor things and
16 Derek and his staff have already assured me
17 that they will correct these going forward into
18 the next year.

19 That's pretty much the highlights.
20 They did a very good job, like I said, keeping
21 the books for y'all. We didn't have any
22 issues. Everyone was professional and was very
23 attentive to whatever we had to request from
24 them.

25 Do y'all have any questions for me?

1 As I said, you have my card and my
2 contact information or reach out to Kim or
3 Derek or Rhonda, they can all get in touch with
4 me. And I will be happy to answer any
5 questions that you have. Thank you.

6 MS. ROBERTSON:

7 As far as Drew's report with the bank
8 recons, again that was the mix-up with Mona
9 leaving and me coming in and not having anybody
10 in. So it took us a minute to catch up, but we
11 will fix that in the future. We are going to
12 be on point, okay.

13 And now for our financial report. If
14 you look at page 1. The balance in the bank
15 account on December 31, was \$2,297,549.39. The
16 current liabilities total on page 2 is
17 \$158,183.09. Total liabilities were
18 \$5,899,113.13. The total net position is a
19 negative \$1,003,402.58. But let's keep in
20 mind, once again, that includes the OPEB
21 liability.

22 So if we turn to page 3, that will
23 start our statement of revenues and expenses.
24 So for the month of December, our year-to-date
25 revenues from the UD license shows an increase

1 of \$1,825. The UP license has an increase of
2 \$4,100. And the CS license has an increase of
3 \$1,300. And our reinstatement fees has
4 increased. It has an increase of \$6,825.
5 Revenue from the PTA convenience fees increased
6 by \$2,540.

7 And on page 4, you would notice that
8 the year-to-date office salaries are
9 \$268,301.77 compared to last year's \$239,240.96
10 is due to us hiring four additional staff up
11 here in the front.

12 And the chart on page 6 shows the
13 increase in licenses from July through
14 December. And we have been showing a steady
15 increase now that we are in renewal season.

16 And on page 7 for all of our CDs
17 renewed for 2023. We have three that will be
18 renewing in January of '24. And on page 8 is
19 our accounts receivable hearing fines which was
20 \$4,566.70. We only collected \$15,000 which was
21 a payment from Matamoros.

22 And also you should have received an
23 email from a company called Paychex. That's
24 our new payroll system. So if you keep up with
25 your check stubs or payments from us, it is

1 going to be coming through them now instead of
2 the Easy Stub that we were using before. So
3 you just have an account on there through that
4 email and you will receive your check stubs
5 when you get payments from us.

6 MR. BRITT:

7 I didn't know if that was a scam,
8 spam, or what.

9 MS. ROBERTSON:

10 Do we have any questions?

11 MR. BRITT:

12 When do we need to get that done?

13 MS. ROBERTSON:

14 There is no deadline, just whenever.
15 Because I think this will be the first month
16 that we process the payment for you-all.

17 If there are no questions, that will
18 conclude the financial report.

19 MR. DONNELL:

20 Make motion to accept.

21 MR. BROWN:

22 Second.

23 MS. MORRIS:

24 Who is going to present the Matamoros
25 issue?

1 MS. BARON:

2 That will be Derek.

3 MS. MORRIS:

4 Mr. Parnell, are you ready to
5 proceed?

6 MR. PARNELL:

7 Yes, I am.

8 MS. MORRIS:

9 I believe Mr. Matamoros is here.

10 MS. BARON:

11 Yes. Both of them are here.

12 MS. MORRIS:

13 Can you-all come to the podium in
14 case there are questions?

15 Is this going to be a hearing? Or is
16 this just going to be some information because
17 there is an existing order for Matamoros?

18 MS. BARON:

19 It is a request. Go ahead.

20 MR. PARNELL:

21 It is a request. It is a request
22 being that we had our hearing November 14 of
23 2022 for Matamoros. They were assessed fines
24 totaling \$250,000. The order stated in that --
25 those fines that the initial payment that they

1 should make is \$50,000 and \$15,000 per month
2 thereafter. The dealer has made payments
3 consecutively every month which has them a
4 total of \$215,000.

5 The dealer communicated to the staff
6 and that he is making a \$20,000 payment, which
7 I understand that he is bringing with him today
8 to the office, which will give him a total
9 \$235,000 paid. He asked that if he can
10 conclude the payments and waive the remaining
11 \$15,000. I did advise the dealer that I don't
12 have a problem with that because he has
13 actually done a really great job at making
14 payments throughout his violation. But I would
15 need to present that information to the
16 Commissioners and we would need a Commission
17 judgment.

18 What I would ask, Commissioners, is
19 that we accept the payment of -- suspend the
20 remaining \$15,000 with stipulations. The
21 stipulation being that they are on probation.
22 If no reported violations are done within the
23 next 12 months, the remaining \$15,000 would be
24 suspended. If any reported violation is done
25 within the next 12 months, the remaining

1 \$15,000 would become due immediately.

2 So with that said, Commissioners, I
3 ask that you accept the \$20,000 payment as, I
4 guess, their final payment and move -- look
5 towards suspending the remaining \$15,000 with
6 probation stipulations for the dealer for the
7 next 12 months.

8 MR. HINES:

9 I agree with Derek and make that
10 motion.

11 MS. MORRIS:

12 Did we want to verify they have the
13 \$20,000 and verify with Mr. Matamoros that he
14 does not object to the conditions that
15 Mr. Parnell mentioned of being under probation
16 for 12 months?

17 MS. BARON:

18 That's the copy of the cashier's
19 check that he brought this morning.

20 MS. MORRIS:

21 Just the record, Mr. Matamoros is
22 here present and he has someone also present
23 with him. Can you give us your name for the
24 record?

25 MR. JOEY MATAMOROS:

1 Joey Matamoros, Jr.

2 MS. MORRIS:

3 And you are providing translation
4 services for Mr. Matamoros?

5 MR. JOEY MATAMOROS:

6 Yes.

7 MS. MORRIS:

8 I was just trying to have all of the
9 information on the record. So you are here
10 just as a translator; is that correct?

11 MR. JOEY MATAMOROS:

12 Yes.

13 MS. MORRIS:

14 So we have a motion.

15 MR. HINES:

16 I make the motion.

17 MR. ALSALEMEH:

18 Second.

19 MR. FLOYD:

20 Motion approved. So we are going to
21 accept the agreement.

22 All in favor?

23 (All "Aye" responses.)

24 MR. FLOYD:

25 Any opposed?

1 (No response.)

2 The Ayes have it.

3 MS. BARON:

4 That is his copy of the cashier's
5 check. He just wanted to show y'all that he
6 had brought it.

7 MS. MORRIS:

8 So we will issue an amended order
9 that will have the new terms in it and showing
10 that the remaining \$15,000 will be suspended
11 and the license will be issued on probation --
12 will be on probation for 12 months. In the
13 event that during the 12-month period there is
14 a violation, then the \$15,000 would be
15 immediately due and payable. If there are no
16 violations within the probation period, then
17 the \$15,000 would be suspended.

18 Thank you.

19 MR. JOEY MATAMOROS:

20 Thank you.

21 MR. FLOYD:

22 All right. So we are going to move
23 to the enforcement report. Montie.

24 MR. WISENOR:

25 Yes, sir. I have the monthly

1 production field totals for the months of
2 November and December of '23. The monthly
3 field production report for November were there
4 were 17 audits conducted. There were 2 notice
5 of revocations issued. There were 65 site
6 visits conducted. There was one cease and
7 desist issued. There were 19 registration or
8 titles that were assisted in consumers
9 receiving. There were no violations issued.
10 There were 2 refunds that were assisted in
11 issuing -- or being received by consumers,
12 which total \$5,000.21. There were 8 cases that
13 were closed that were assigned cases -- I am
14 sorry, 18 cases were closed, cases that were
15 assigned. There were 21 cases closed that were
16 not assigned. And there were 20 physical
17 inspections conducted.

18 For December of '23, there were 4
19 conducted -- audits conducted. There was one
20 notice of revocation issued. There were 71
21 site visits conducted. There were no cease and
22 desist issued for that month. There were 20
23 titles or registrations that were assisted in
24 consumers receiving. There were 6 violations
25 issued. There was 1 refund which totaled \$350.

1 There were 20 cases closed that were assigned.
2 There were 29 cases closed that not were not
3 assigned. And 14 physical inspections
4 conducted for the month of December.

5 And those are the totals from
6 November and December of '23.

7 MR. FLOYD:

8 All right. Commissioners, do you
9 have any questions?

10 Okay. We have the executive
11 director's report.

12 MS. BARON:

13 Mr. Parnell.

14 MR. PARNELL:

15 I'm here. Yes. I really don't have
16 quite a bit to discuss. Our renewal season has
17 been going very well, very efficient with the
18 hiring of the additional staff.

19 Ms. Burks, she is present. Can you
20 give some of the information to the
21 Commissioners, the information about dealer
22 plates as it relates to the last two years,
23 2022 and 2023, where we are through August to
24 December.

25 MS. BURKS:

1 Okay.

2 MR. PARNELL:

3 Do you have those numbers?

4 MS. BURKS:

5 I do. Just to let y'all know that we
6 did sell the dealer plates last year. Our
7 numbers actually have doubled from last year
8 and I think they will continue going up
9 especially as the dealers know that we are
10 actually renewing these plates.

11 We are going to have a meeting with
12 Loren, she is part of the Office of Motor
13 Vehicles. She is actually getting us all set
14 up for the dealer plates. Just trying to
15 expand it.

16 We could do, like, motorcycle plates
17 but we cannot, of course, give out new plates
18 for motorcycles. So I just want to meet with
19 her and just try to have some type of
20 conversation of how we can expand it, but our
21 numbers have increased.

22 Just an example, like, last year in
23 August -- well, of '22 had two plates. This
24 year -- well, in '23, we had 45. And just
25 going back to December in '22, we did 9. And

1 in '23 we did 200. So our numbers did double.

2 So I just wanted to give you an
3 update to let you know that we are doing pretty
4 well now.

5 MR. DONNELL:

6 So, Tonya, you are saying that
7 anybody can walk in here, public and all, and
8 needs a renewal sticker, we can do that?

9 MS. BURKS:

10 Right now it is just the dealers.

11 MR. DONNELL:

12 We can't give out plates.

13 MS. BARON:

14 Just for the dealers.

15 MR. DONNELL:

16 Oh, okay.

17 MS. BURKS:

18 Now, we have the capability to do it.

19 MR. PARNELL:

20 We have the authority to do.

21 MS. BURKS:

22 So right now we just focus on the
23 dealers.

24 MR. PARNELL:

25 We concentrate specifically on the

1 dealer side giving that convenience to our
2 licensed dealers. But there is -- there is an
3 avenue for growth if that is something we
4 wanted to look into to moving forward. That's
5 why we are going to have that discussion with
6 the Office of Motor Vehicles and see what kind
7 of parameters that are out there for us. Okay.

8 Thank you, Tonya, for that.

9 MS. BURKS:

10 You're welcome.

11 MR. PARNELL:

12 And, Rhonda, we've gone with Paychex.
13 We have outsourced the payroll process with
14 Paychex. Just to continue moving forward,
15 progressive forward with our agency and get
16 more efficient on what we are doing. We found
17 that the cost of outsourcing of that was
18 minuscule in relation to, you know, the process
19 of processing it per se.

20 So with that said, we are looking
21 towards the regular legislative session begins
22 -- I think if I am not incorrect March 11 for
23 the regular legislative session. This current
24 year we don't have any legislative packet that
25 we are putting forward.

1 But one thing we are doing is kind of
2 making sure that we're not running into
3 situations where we have someone putting some
4 language out there that affects our dealers.
5 So we have all of our, quote/unquote, feelers
6 out there. We will make sure that we are
7 monitoring legislation just to see if anything
8 does pop up outside of -- that we don't know as
9 of yet. That's all that I had.

10 Once again, Commissioners, I do
11 apologize I was not able to be present today,
12 but I was doing it for your best interest.

13 MR. FLOYD:

14 Okay. Thank you, Director Parnell.
15 Ms. Kim, we are moving to items for the next
16 agenda.

17 MS. BARON:

18 There may be public comments for the
19 next agenda. I was supposed to have public
20 comments this morning, but they emailed me and
21 said they would have to reschedule. So that
22 might be the only one for next month, but
23 that's not confirmed yet but.

24 MR. FLOYD:

25 Okay. So up next we have a hearing.

1 So we will take a small recess for ten minutes.
