21	is the adoption and approval of minutes. I
22	hope everybody has had a chance to read them.
23	Any corrections or changes, let us know. If
24	not, I would entertain a motion.

2	MR. POTEET:
3	I've got a motion from Darty.
4	MR. DONNELL:
5	Second.
6	MR. POTEET:
7	Second from Mr. Donnell.
8	All in favor, say, "Aye."
9	(All "Aye" responses.)
10	MR. POTEET:
11	Any opposed?
12	(No response.)
13	MR. POTEET:
14	All right. So let's go ahead and do
15	the financial stuff right now. And then we'll
16	get to the new agenda item.
17	MS. ANDERSON:
18	Okay. If you'll turn in your binders
19	to the financial statement for the month ending
20	August 31, 2019. Under the statement of net
21	position, the total current assets at the end
22	of the August were \$3,315,840. Of that, the
23	operating account total was \$2,078,510. The
24	accounts receivable were \$504,623. And there
25	were no changes in the remaining assets.

The current liabilities at the bottom of the page and at the top of page 2, the current liabilities were \$71,026. Long-term liabilities increased only slightly from the prior month. And the total liabilities and inflows were \$4,165,061. On page 3 is the statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position. Year-to-date revenues were \$426,558 compared to \$65,663 last year. And the main area of increase was in fines and we'll discuss that shortly on the hearing fines report.

On page 4, the salaries and related benefit expenses were only slightly higher than last year. The remainder of the expenses were higher than the previous year in the areas of legal fees, vehicle maintenance, and telephone expenses due to some one time expenses on our telephone. The change in net position on page 5 was -- year-to-date was \$165,657.

Page 6 is the four-year revenue comparison. The most significant increase, of course, was in the fines area. And as I said, we'll talk about that when I give the fine report. The graph on page 7 compares the

revenues in the -- in four of the categories, fees, auctions, fines, and miscellaneous revenue. Page 8 shows a year-to-date budget to actual comparison on expenditures. In the second month of the fiscal year and the -- we are well within budget at this point. On page 9, the certificate of deposit report, there were no changes for August.

On page 10, on the hearing and fine report, \$7,600 in fines were assessed in August and 14,350 were collected. In addition, the Attorney General's Office collected \$24,660 on the accounts for Lauco, Michael Laue, Shawn Calvit, and Ready To Go Autoplex. In the years past, we had written these amounts off. Like, the Lauco balance was 278,000. So in order to apply the payments that they're collecting, we had to re-recognize that revenue. So that's why you're seeing such a big increase on the revenue for the month and year-to-date as compared to last year. The accounts receivable fines balance at the end of the month was \$504,623.

And unless there are any questions, Mr. Chairman, that concludes my report.

24	don't have one. And it's up for a nomination,
25	I guess.

2	As far as I know, that's something we
3	decide within the within our Commission. So
4	I guess if something happened, maybe, if I get
5	rolled over by a bus, you would have to elect
6	one then.
7	MR. DONNELL:
8	Well, when Mr. Duplessis stepped
9	down, Jefferey Britt got a letter and he sent
10	it to me and said am I the vice chairman? I
11	don't know. Kind of looked like that's what
12	the letter said. That's why I carried a copy
13	of it to Ellen Palmintier at Boards and
14	Commissions. She said, no, the Governor
15	appointments the you, the chairman, and then
16	the Commission elects a vice chairman.
17	MR. POTEET:
18	Yes. I'm not sure Ron was the vice
19	chairman. He was just
20	MR. DONNELL:
21	The letter said he was.
22	MS. MORRIS:
23	He was the chair, and then there was

an agreement, I think when it came up for

approval by the senate committee, that he would

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1 become the vice chair and the chair would 2 remain. 3 MR. DONNELL: 4 Well, the letter --5 MS. MORRIS: 6 On the confirmation hearing, I think 7 that was done. 8 MR. POTEET: 9 Okay. That was done, okay. Well, that's fine with me. I don't have any problem 10 11 with that. This is what I would like to do: 12 Since we only have six of us here, I'm going to 13 make a suggestion that anyone that's interested 14 in that position to send an email to Derek and 15 And if we have more than one, then what we 16 can do is, we can bring those names before the 17 Commission and vote on it, you know. I guess I 18 could appoint one. I was the vice chairman 19 when Glen Robinson was the chairman and he just 20 appointed me. But I certainly don't want to 21 appoint somebody who -- if they're not 2.2 interested and I don't want somebody who is 23 interested to not be considered.

MR. DONNELL:

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That's just what the boards and

1 commission said that we have to elect one.

2 MR. POTEET:

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3 Okay. That's okay with me.

MS. MORRIS:

Is that person going to serve as the chairman of the legislative committee or?

MR. POTEET:

Yes. That's what we -- I think we would do. That way, we sort of combine that. So for this group, what we'll need to do, probably, is -- Derek, if you don't mind, if you would send out an email, so everybody sees the email, because, obviously, there are four of us not here today, and just say that it was discussed and if anyone is interested, please give us -- you know, send us back a response within -- well, certainly, before the next meeting. And then we can -- we can put that on the agenda, and then we can vote on it. said, if only one person is interested, that person gets the job. If more than one person is interested, then the Commission will vote. And if we have a quorum -- if there are only six of us next time -- those six will decide that. Have to have six to zero, wouldn't it?

1	If I remember the way the voting works.
2	MR. OLAVE:
3	If there's more than one person
4	interested, I'd like to see a debate scheduled,
5	so we can have the parties and I can make a
6	determination properly. Voir dire the
7	candidates. I mean, you know.
8	MR. POTEET:
9	Well, if there are more than one, we
10	can certainly ask them what they what they
11	bring to the party. So I don't know. I mean,
12	we might have none. Okay. So is everybody in
13	agreement with that? We're okay with that?
14	Sounds good.
15	And, Derek, can you just send out a
16	brief email, so all of the members will know?
17	All right. Next on our agenda is the
18	ratification of imposed penalties.
19	MR. PARNELL:
20	Commissioners, you will find in your
21	packet a chart that illustrates that licensees
22	that were in violation of state law. These
23	cases have been investigated and I have

determined that public interest can be served

without further administrative proceedings.

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1	The civil penalties were I will announce the
2	names of the dealers that have been imposed
3	civil penalties for the record.
4	Do we have any representation with
5	anybody that is on the chart?
6	MS. BARON:
7	I will check. No, sir. We do not.
8	MR. PARNELL:
9	All right. I'll go through the list.
10	Southern Star Auto Group, LLC, from Kentwood,
11	Louisiana, violation fine amount is \$1,700.
12	Power Auto Group, LLC, from Lafayette,
13	Louisiana, fine amount is \$200. Coy Dupree,
14	doing business as Dupree's Auto Salvage, from
15	Opelousas, Louisiana, fine amount is \$1,500.
16	Scott Patin, doing business as S&S Auto Sales,
17	from Carencro, Louisiana, fine amount is
18	\$1,100. Anderson Auto Sales, LLC, from Duson,
19	Louisiana, fine amount is \$1,550. CPCI,
20	Incorporated, doing business as Com Auto, from
21	Opelousas, Louisiana, fine amount is \$150.
22	Variety Motors, LLC, from Lake Charles,
23	Louisiana, fine amount is \$1,400. B&S Used
24	Cars, LLC, from Ville Platte, Louisiana, fine
25	amount is \$1,400. Commissioners, I ask that

you ratify the imposed civil penalties
assessed. The total amount of civil penalties
for the month is \$9,000.

## MR. DONNELL:

I've got a question, again. Tell me the difference between failing to submit monthly reports and failing to maintain records.

## MR. PARNELL:

reports is just that. If you do not submit your monthly reports for the month, that's usually one count. Every month is usually a count. Failure to maintain records could be really anything. Like, for example, if we do investigate your file and you don't have a copy of the title that you have submitted off. It could be anything that's not perfect in your records that's associated with that file when you close out a sale.

It's two different counts then,

right? Two different --

## MR. PARNELL:

Two different things.

2	I'm going to probably vote against
3	this, this time, because I'd like to look at
4	the field officer's report to see what those
5	tickets were wrote for.

7	All right. Well, do you want just
8	one or do you want to look at all of them?
9	MR. DONNELL:
10	We can just pick out one of some of
11	these strange amounts, you know.
12	MR. POTEET:
13	Okay. Well, usually, the way we
14	handle this is, we do the ratifications as one
15	thing. So if you're going to if you want
16	something separate, you're going to have to

16	you can look at those whenever.
17	MR. DONNELL:
18	I just want to make sure we're not
19	double dipping.
20	MR. POTEET:
21	Okay. All right. Next on the agenda
22	is the Executive Director's report.
23	MR. PARNELL:
24	Commissioners, you will also find in
25	your packet a chart that illustrates the

1 what took place over the month. The first 2 charge is alleged issue counts. The first one 3 you'll find is under 20 alleged issues for the 4 Also, you will find that the case month. report has 48 cases assigned. Three of those 5 6 cases have been completed. 45 of those cases 7 The department summary report remain open. 8 illustrates the total amount of cases that were 9 closed for the month. You'll see that chart 10 illustration. There were 10 cases that were 11 closed for the month. In further news, the 12 rule and regulation draft, it was brought to 13 the -- the final draft -- the fiscal office --14 we do submit it to the fiscal office. Economic 15 impact statement was done with -- we're in a 16 situation right now with Roz Moore, the Boards 17 and Commissions director. During the last 18 legislative session, they created an 19 occupational license review commission. 20 was a deadline to submit -- to have our draft 21 of the notice of intent to go before that 22 board. They had a meeting at the end of 23 August. They're going to have their next 2.4 meeting in October. They don't meet monthly. 25 They meet every other month. So what we have

1	to do with our rule and reg, we have to go
2	before that board to get approval of our rule
3	and regulation before we submit the next step,
4	which is the notice of intent.
5	Correct?
6	MS. MORRIS:
7	Correct.
8	MR. PARNELL:
9	So I just wanted to let you all know
10	that. We don't have an actual date right now.
11	Our name is on the list. They haven't created
12	the agenda as of yet. So we won't know exactly
13	until what date that's going to be on. So
14	we don't know at this point.
15	MR. POTEET:
16	What exactly is that?
17	MS. MORRIS:
18	This new board is was created
19	because of concerns over lawsuits that have
20	been filed in other states about members of the
21	industry serving on regulatory boards. And so
22	it's to have an independent review. And in our
23	law was, you know, you go before the

legislative oversight committee, which was the

independent review for the Legislature, almost

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1 never had oversight. And so now they've 2 created a board that will review it before it ever gets published and that was for the 3 4 purpose of trying to avoid what's happened in 5 some other states to argue that there is an 6 independent review. And this board is supposed 7 to be looking for things that would be protectionist, like trying to keep people out 8 9 of the industry or things like that, because, 10 you know, it's been argued in other states that 11 the boards that are composed of industry 12 participants trying to create a monopoly for 13 the industry. It's to make sure that there's no unnecessary regulation and that it's fair in 14 15 the process. So they've been doing this since January of this year. And I'm not aware of any 16 17 rules that have been submitted that haven't 18 been approved by the commission. They're 19 having a little bit of change in procedure. 20 think before, they were meeting once they got a 21 request for renewal. Now, it looks like 22 they've gone to an every other month thing. 23 The person that was handling it for the boards 2.4 and commissions went on to another job. 25 it's a new person. They are kind of getting

1 their procedures straight. 2 MR. DONNELL: 3 What's her name, Roz? MR. PARNELL: 4 5 Roz Moore. 6 MR. MORRIS: 7 Roz. 8 MR. POTEET: 9 So I can see that. I can see that as 10 a -- as a concern, I guess. I don't -- I can't 11 think of -- I've been on this Commission for 10 12 years. I think 10 years. But I can't think of 13 anything we've done that would fall into that 14 category. But I can certainly see how somebody 15 from the outside looking in could say your 16 commission could easily exclude people. But if 17 you look -- if you look at our rules and regs 18 -- I've got two lawyers in here -- I mean, those are not written in that form. 19 20 MS. MORRIS: 21 Right. I feel like the Commission 2.2 has done a lot to protect the consumers. 23 MR. POTEET: 2.4 Yes, yes. 25 MS. MORRIS:

1	It's been more than fair.
2	MR. POTEET:
3	And I think every car dealer that
4	I've ever talked to that's been on this
5	Commission has always been, we want to enforce
6	the laws to make sure that our industry
7	maintains it's integrity. You know, bad actors
8	hurt the whole industry. So when we had things
9	that have come up, I thought we've been I
10	wouldn't say we've bent over backwards for the
11	consumers, but I can't ever think of a time
12	when we really didn't support the consumers in
13	any sort of
14	MR. OLAVE:
15	Absolutely.
16	MR. POTEET:
17	from these lawsuits. Well, no,
18	you actually said that the lawsuits are coming
19	from people who say they want to they're
20	concerned about anti-trust mostly.
21	MS. MORRIS:
22	Right. It's anti-trust suits where
23	the FDC has sued the dental board in one state.
24	That was the real estate and appraisers
25	board in the state of Louisiana has been sued,

1	but it arises out of litigation around the
2	country.
3	MR. OLAVE:
4	We got we got sued individually
5	during Katrina by the RV Dealers Association.
6	MR. POTEET:
7	That was before my time.
8	MR. OLAVE:
9	It was thrown out. It was thrown
10	out.
11	MR. POTEET:
12	Anything else?
13	MR. PARNELL:
14	That's all.
15	MR. POTEET:
16	Okay. Well, we have one item for the
17	next agenda, the vice chairman.
18	Anything else to discuss?
19	MR. OLAVE:
20	How is how are things going with
21	the timeline? I was reading different things
22	from Sheri, some correspondence, with the
23	timeline as far as the rules for the continuing
24	education.
25	MS. MORRIS:

1	That's what we were just talking
2	about. It's going to go before the
3	occupational license review board, because you
4	have industry participants on the Commission.
5	MR. OLAVE:
6	No, I understand. But how are we on
7	our rules? Are they ready to go, though?
8	MS. MORRIS:
9	We got approved of the fiscal office.
10	So the next approval we need is the
11	occupational license review. And then it will
12	get published. Then, there will be a comment
13	period if anybody submits comments. So if we
14	get if there are any comments, we'll have to
15	hold a public hearing. But absent that, then
16	we'll go on to publish it.
17	MR. POTEET:
18	So that little timeline we had from
19	the last meeting is still on track pretty much?
20	MS. MORRIS:
21	It might be January than December.
22	MR. OLAVE:
23	So then after we get the publication
24	or published, then we open that up to
25	potential vendors, correct?

1	MS. MORRIS:
2	Correct. People can submit
3	applications.
4	MR. OLAVE:
5	So that should happen in January,
6	also?
7	MS. MORRIS:
8	Yes.
9	MR. OLAVE:
10	Okay. And do we do we have any
11	idea of the I know we I know one
12	candidate for sure.
13	MR. PARNELL:
14	There is one for sure. There was
15	another entity that contacted us, probably
16	about six months ago. I don't remember their
17	name offhand, but they do they do host
18	seminars, per se. And I'll reach back out to
19	them. I can kind of bring them before you.
20	MR. OLAVE:
21	It would be nice to have a
22	competitive type of environment in that, you
23	know, so we know what
24	MR. PARNELL:
25	I would be open up for that, because

1	we've already created an application for that.
2	So whoever reaches out and expresses interest
3	of it, we will send them an application on what
4	exactly they need to do.
5	MR. OLAVE:
6	Can we can we encourage that,
7	though, as you know, encourage, you know,
8	other candidates that are coming forward?
9	MR. POTEET:
10	Sure. Find somebody to encourage.
11	MR. OLAVE:
12	No, no. I'm just saying I don't know
13	if there's an industry or a trade publication
14	or anything that we could you know, once
15	it's published or what-have-you, that we could
16	actually encourage.
17	MR. POTEET:
18	I think don't you have something
19	that I'm trying to remember.
20	MR. HALLACK:
21	You should avoid supporting somebody,
22	though. You should avoid
23	MR. PARNELL:
24	We can't really do that.
25	MR. OLAVE:

1	Well, absolutely, but, again, I hate
2	not to let them know that we're accepting
3	applications because there are companies that
4	don't people that can do that that don't
5	know that we have you know.
6	MR. POTEET:
7	We did talk about that a few months
8	ago.
9	MR. PARNELL:
10	Yes. We can do that.
11	MS. MORRIS:
12	It would be published in the in
13	the register and I think some of those
14	companies that do continuing education, they
15	always look for that, too, so.
16	MR. POTEET:
17	They monitor certain words.
18	MR. OLAVE:
19	I just think it's proactive, you
20	know. That's all. I don't know how they think
21	they can do
22	MS. MORRIS:
23	I don't know where else you would put
24	it, but some of them, you know, are monitoring
25	for that and they'll see the rules.

1	MR. OLAVE:
2	I wonder if they have, like, you
3	know, other companies, other states use or
4	dividend entities use companies like that that
5	we could send an email to or something saying,
6	hey, I might be interested in putting a bid in
7	on this, just so we have choices. I mean, I
8	just you know.
9	MR. PARNELL:
10	Yes.
11	MR. OLAVE:
12	I'd like to see
13	MR. POTEET:
14	Well, I think Sheri's point, these
15	guys that are in this business, what they do
16	is, they monitor just like the lobbyists do,
17	they monitor
18	MR. OLAVE:
19	Agreed, Mr. Chairman. This, again,
20	is more of a proactive approach.
21	MR. PARNELL:
22	Because this was right after the
23	legislative session when I got their contact.
24	So they were already monitoring, you know, what
25	we were trying to do.

1	MR. POTEET:
2	We will do whatever we can to get -
3	MR. PARNELL:
4	Whether it's one or 10 of them, it
5	doesn't really matter.
6	MR. POTEET:
7	Well, you can approve more than one
8	right?
9	MR. PARNELL:
10	Oh, yes.
11	MR. POTEET:
12	You can approve more than one, and
13	then the dealers can decide who they're going
14	to use.
15	MR. POTEET:
16	Motion to adjourn?
17	MR. SMITH:
18	Motion to adjourn.
19	MR. DONNELL:
20	Second.
