## Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority



CPRA Implementation Update — Glenn Ledet, CPRA (video: 00:15:45) Mr. Ledet provided an update to the board on stating that CPRA has 110 active projects • 43 of them are in construction, 62 are in E&D, with 5 more in the planning stage. • Of the projects now being constructed, 34 are hurricane protection projects and 38 are creating marsh. Marsh creation leads the way in E&D with 28 projects moving toward the construction phase. The Rockefeller Shoreline Protection features two o RESTORE Parish Matching projects. These projects were selected through a competitive process that required the parish to match a portion of their RESTORE funding to CPRA's RESTORE funding. The project will be constructed along the Rockefeller Wildlife Refuge and Gulf of Mexico shoreline. The structure is a 1.14 mile continuation of the CWPPRA ME-18 and STATE ME-0037 projects. Protecting the Rockefeller Shoreline has only been possible due to the great partnerships between CPRA/the state and Cameron Parish. In total, these projects combined equate to over 7 miles of shoreline protection and an over \$28 million dollar investment in Southwest LA/The Rockefeller Refuge. The Manchac Landbridge (Rock Breakwater) Shoreline Protection **Project** is another RESTORE Parish Matching project. The main purpose of the Manchac project is to continue efforts of the Coastal Impact Assistance Program with the construction of rock breakwater on the Lake Pontchartrain shoreline southwest of the Tangipahoa River and east of Pass Manchac. This project will preserve shoreline integrity and reduce wetland degradation from wave erosion along the shoreline of Lake Pontchartrain, benefitting surrounding shoreline habitat. Construction on this project is set to begin in the very near future; just waiting for the contractor to mobilize to the site. The Storm Surge Risk Reduction for Section E-North project: The portion of the work that CPRA is providing funding for the Phase 1 where material is being borrowed and stockpiled adjacent to the levee for future work where it will be placed on the crown of the levee to raise the elevation. SLLD is moving some of the material on the slope (protected side) of the levee to allow space for additional material to be stockpiled behind the levee. At this time SLLD will pay to construct the levee lift in a future construction event. Mr. Ledet also provided an update on the NFWF Resilience Fund: CPRA - \$7.7 Million- Restore marsh habitat on the south rim of Grand Lake to create and nourish tidal marshes that provide important habitat for fish and wildlife and provide natural storm buffers for communities. This project will re-establish a more robust landmass between River aux Chenes and Lake Lery as part of a long-range restoration plan for enhancing the resilience of communities and ecosystems in coastal Louisiana.; National Audubon Society -\$489k; Ducks Unlimited - \$650k.





CPRA - \$1.1 Million • Perform data inventory and needs assessment, land ownership investigation, survey and geotechnical investigations, cultural resources investigation, alternatives analysis and preliminary design of living shoreline features. Project will, once implemented, protect shoreline from wind-induced wave erosion, sustain and augment fisheries habitat, buffer against storms and limit wave fetch to reduce vegetation loss. The Ponchartrain Conservancy received \$450k; Lowlander Center- \$885k; Grand Isle Independent Levee District - \$607k and Ducks Unlimited granted \$6.2 million. In Mr. Ledet's update on the Annual Plan, he stated that the sooner public comments are submitted, the better.



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In closing, Mr. Ledet announced March 25<sup>th</sup> as Coastal Day at the Legilature and extended an invitation to everyone in hopes of their attending. CPRA will host a business networking event and matchmaking event in Partnership with CTAC in the morning at the Center for River Studies, plus a coastal project forecast.

VII. USACE Update- Col. Jones, USACE (video: 00:38:14) Col. Jones began his presentation by presenting to the board a map of the New Orleans District projects & studies representing how they work with CPRA and other state agencies and their local teammates. The map shows World River Control Complex in the Gulf of Mexico from heel to toe they have tactic, construction projects and studies all buy down risk for live, property, and prosperity (see below).




Col. Jones also expressed the criticality of getting the public scoping comments throughout (Comprehensive Management Plan). In addition to the five in person meetings that they're going to have throughout Louisiana. There is going to be a total of 14 going up and down the river as the scope of this study is going to be huge across seven states. The purpose of this \$525 study is to develop actionable recommendatins on comprehensive management across multiple purposes. Everything ranging from hurricane to storm damage reduction, flood mitigation, it promotes structural non structural solution, flood plain management strategies and also navigation, ecosystem restoration, environmental restoration, water supply, hydropower, recreation and various other things. The 2nd project that Col. Jones elaborated on is what he likes to refer as the Louisiana Southern flank of Grand Isle. He shared some of the great progress that they've had today and how they're continuing to move forward with CPRA to build a resilient barrier island as part of their three legged school barrier islands, beneficial usage materila, and diversions as they creat a resilient southweast unit. From there, Col. Jones directed his presentation up north to the hurricane storam damage risk reduction system and showed how the continued progress that they've had at the permanent canal closures and pumps (see slides below). In Phase II: Deliver The Project As Designed. The mission is: Multi-year effort to ensure all 17 pumps are sustanable, reliable and fulfill the 35-year design requirements. Their commitment is to ensure open and transparent communication throughout the process and provide regular and recurring updates to partners, stakeholders and the public.



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Colonel Jones also provided updates on the STPFS-Proposed Levee Alignment as well as the West Shore Lake Ponchartrain Projects (slides below). With the STPFS, the USACE has been able to give a recommeded plan but they're going to look at construction of a west south side of an 18.5 miles of revenues, flood walls, drainage strutures, new pump stations, and then complementing that with the ability to provide non structural solutions for about 6,500 residents in St. Tammany parish. The Colonel stated that about 60, 000 residents are going to see a deduction of storm risk in that area where they have not seen it in the near future. In regards to the West Shore Lake Pontchartrain project, there is continued momentum on this project. Another 18.5 mile of levee system of flood walls, drainage structures, and rink lakes are currently supporting St. James Parish. Once again, another 60,000 residents in south Louisiana across those three parishes. In closing, the Colonel stated that last year, they received a record amount of awards; there were \$330 million dollars across eight contracts and five ongoing.



### VIII. Louisiana Seafood Promotion and Marketing Board Presentation- Samantha Carroll, LSP& MB (video: 01:08:23)

Ms. Carroll presented a video on behalf of the LA Seafood Promotion and Marketing Board and other seafood industry members who have voiced their concerns regarding the diversion project. In her introduction, Ms. Carroll stated that she is not only the Exec. Dir of the Seafood Promotion and Marketing Board, but that she is also a restaurant owner and as an owner here in Louisiana, she strives to represent the Louisiana culture in their cuisine. Ms. Carroll stated that there are adverse impacts to oyster fisheries, shrimp industry, estuaries, and to take into consideration the human aspect. Mr. Malone former board member of the seafood marketing board stated that his family isn't in favor of the project and feels that it will cost the industry millions of dollars.

IX. Conservation and Restoration Partnership Fund – Brandon Champagne, CPRA (video: 02:04:33) Mr. Champagne updated the board on the Conservation and Restoration Partnership Fund Program and it's FY24 Awards. Since 2008, CPRA has contributed over \$13 million in funding to 23 non-federal partners and their projects through the Parternship Fund program. Mr. Champagne indicated that through the FY24 Conservation and Restoration Partenership Fund, CPRA is providing \$1,000,000 in matching funds for projects aimed at coastal conservation and restoration. CPRA uses this program funding to further leverage its funds to achieve its coastal restoration goals. He

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stated that the prroposals were evaluated with the following criteria and considerations: Consistent with the goals and objectives of 2023 Master Plan, acreage conserved or restored, synergy with other consevation and restoration efforts, project constructability and matching funds.



Federal Update - Neal McMillin, DENR (video: 01:08:23) Mr. McMillin provided the board with an update on matters at the Federal level. He stated that as many know by now, Cong. Mike Johnson of Louisiana's 4th District was elected as the first Speaker of the House from the Pelican State on Oct 25, 2023. He stated that with retirements and the expelling of a member, Speaker Johnson will now face an even tighter majority than the former speaker. With a full Congress, a majority must have 218 members. With three vacancies, Speaker Johnson can only lose up to two votes if everyone is present. FY24 Appropriations: While the border and foreign policy have been major issues during his Speakership, funding the government is the urgent issue. Currently, the federal government is scheduled to shut down partially on March 1 and fully on March 8. Earmarks such as those supporting Louisiana Army Corps projects or proposed funding to CPRA for monitoring equipment would not be passed through a CR. Mr. McMillin also provided the board with the outcome of his and former Chairman Bren Haase attending the Sen. Environment and Public Works Committee: On November 29, 2023, the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee held a hearing titled "WRDA 2024: Stakeholder Feedback on USACE Project Partnership Agreements." Takeaways from CPRA Chairman Bren Haase Testimony--Louisiana's Experience: Since 2007, CPRA has signed approximately 40 PPAs, Feasibility Cost Sharing Agreements, Design Agreements, and Memoranda of Understanding/Agreement. Activate Flexibilities: Congress should encourage USACE to use the flexibilities given to adapt agreements to the unique circumstances of a project. Beneficial for USACE to allow for a "deviation" from a model agreement to improve projects. Address Deficiencies: Agreements should provide recourse to the non-Federal sponsor when there are federally-led deficiencies that impact the success of the project, including related to liability. Increase Transparency: Non-Federal sponsors should receive better insight into federal expenses, since the sponsor must supply its cost share even when project costs escalate. Right-sizing Land Rights: Full fee title ownership of a project's area is not a fit for many ecosystem restoration projects. Crediting: Agreements should have provisions to allow the non-Federal sponsor to easily receive all due credit. Empower District Commander: The USACE District should have the ability to make many of these judgements. Mr. McMillin also updated on CPRA's request for WRDA 2024, Offshore Energy and the Increased Support for RISEE Act. On January 11, 2024, the House Natural Resources Subcommittee on Energy and Mineral Resources held a hearing titled "Examining the Biden Administration's Limits on Access to the OCS: Impacts on Consumers, States, and Operators." Key hearing theme was the revenue impacts to states and localities from the reduced offshore oil and gas leasing scheduled through the Department of Interior's 2024-2029 National Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) Oil and Gas Leasing Program, which was finalized on December 14, 2023.
