MEETING MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER

Public Comments

Chairman Garber asked if there were any comments from the public and there were none. He thanked Mr. Boudreaux for attending the meeting today. He also congratulated the LSU men's baseball team on winning the championship yesterday.

Approval of the agenda

Chairman Garber called for a motion to approve the June 27, 2023 SSWCC agenda.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

NRCS/OSWC Farm Bill Cooperative Agreement

Mr. Breaux said May's Farm Bill drawdown was \$57,313 leaving a balance of \$249,190. Eighteen districts have maxed out their farm bill funds with the highest monthly earning being approximately \$31,000. The total amount that districts have exceeded their maximum earnings is approaching \$160,000. Mr. Breaux said discussions for the upcoming farm bill agreement will happen soon. Chairman Garber asked were there any questions or comments and there were none.

LA Legislative Regular Session Updates-

Mr. Breaux mentioned some recent updates to the following bills from the Legislative Analysis list:

- 1. SB 22- (Sen. Glen Womack)- Provides relative to soil conservation policy. (Status: Signed and became Act 185)
- 2. HB 82- (Rep. Kathy Edmonston) which was set to abolish the Louisiana Environmental Education Commission was repealed and removed. (Status: Removed)
- 3. HB425 (Rep. Ryan Bourriaque) and SB 102 (Sen. Fred Mills)- relative to the creation of the Acadiana Watershed District. (Status: SB 102 was signed and became Act 325)
- 4. SB 42 (Sen. Fred Mills)- Creates the LA Watershed Initiative; Management Council (Status: No Movement)
- 5. HB 453 (Rep. Sherman Mack)- Requires that carbon dioxide injected for geologic sequestration using a Class VI injection well be transported to and sequestered in a storage facility in the Gulf of Mexico. (Status: Deferred)
- 6. HB 454 (Representative Sherman Mack)- Requires a local election for the approval of carbon dioxide sequestration within a parish. (Status: Deferred)
- 7. HB 465 (Rep. Valerie Hodges)- Provides relative to the Louisiana Scenic Rivers Act. (Status: No movement)
- 8. HB 570 (Rep. Alan Seabaugh)- Establishes a bounty to control feral hogs. (Status: No Movement)
- 9. HB 476 (Rep. Mike Huval)- Establishes the Acadiana Watershed District. (Status: No movement)
- 10. HCR 45 (Rep. Phillip Devillier)- Creates the Louisiana Solar Sitting Task Forces to study the impact of, and alternatives to, locating solar energy developments on farmland. Provides for the composition of the task forces, structure, meeting requirements, and quorum. (Status: adopted)
- 11. HB 537 (Rep. Valerie Hodges)- Provides for a prohibition against foreign adversary purchasing, leasing, or acquiring land. (Status: Sent to governor)
- 12. SB 206 (Sen. Barry Milligan)- Provides relative to foreign interest in certain Louisiana research facilities. (Status: Signed and is now Act 106)
- 13. SCR 6 (Sen. Bob Hensgens)- Approves the annual state integrated coastal protection plan for Fiscal Year 2024, as adopted by the Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority Board (CPRA). (Status: Sent to Sec. of State)
- 14. SCR 17 (Sen. Bob Hensgens)- Approves the comprehensive master plan for integrated coastal protection. (Status: Sent to Secretary of State)
- 15. SR 21 (Sen. Stewart Cathey)- Designates May 4, 2023, as Future Farmers of America (FFA) Day at the Louisiana Capital and commends the officers of the Louisiana FFA Association. (Status: Sent to Secretary of State)
- 16. HCR 81(Rep. Michael Echols)- Establishes the ArkLaMiss Timber and Bioinnovation Corridor Commission. (Status: Sent to Secretary of State)

NACD Summer Meeting

Mr. Breaux said NACD's Summer Meeting is scheduled for July 15-19, 2023 in Bismarck, North Dakota. Workshops that include discussions on regenerative grazing and ESMC's Eco-Harvest program are scheduled as well as conservation tours to Black Leg ranch and Cooperative research farm with a visit to Menoken farm.

NACD South Central Region Meeting

NACD's South Central Region meeting is scheduled for August 13-15,2023 in Arlington, TX. This two-day event includes a tour to the 77 Ranch in Navarro County as well as having dinner at Joe T. Garcia's restaurant which has been a Fort Worth staple since 1935. NACD requests that reserve rooms by July 24, 2023.

Out of state travel

Chairman Garber said we received 2 out of state travel requests:

NRCS State Conservationist Report- Ms. Candis Voorhies, NRCS Assistant State Conservationist for Partnerships and Initiatives

Ms. Voorhies reported the following information:

NRCS Staffing

- 215 Full time employees
- Currently making selections for about 20 Resource Conservationists positions
- Civil/Agricultural Engineer (5 positions) open until 06/30/2023
- Easement Coordinator vacancy announcement
- Advertising the Assistant Manager vacancy at Plant at the Plant Materials Center
- 15 Soil Conservationist positions are expected to be advertised in a few weeks.

Programs

- 80% of EQIP funds have been obligated. NRCS was allocated 23 million this fiscal year.
- Beginning to obligate CSP funds. NRCS was allocated 17 million this fiscal year.
- RCPP signups end August 16, 2023.
- Still working on EWP projects from Hurricane Ida. NRCS hopes to finish these projects by the end of the year.
- NRCS headquarters has requested additional practices to be added to the IRA climate smart practice list. Louisiana requested that the following practices be added:
 - 1. Irrigation water management
 - 2. Prescribed grazing
 - 3. Upland wildlife habitat management
- Climate Smart Commodities has done a lot of work on their dashboard on their website. If you go on their website, there is an interactive map of the United States. Currently, Louisiana has 18 projects that have been submitted by only 7 of them have been fully approved. The only project currently open for signup is the US Cotton Trust protocol. A video was posted on YouTube on how you can apply for this project, how much you could receive when you apply, and eligible land requirements. With phase 1, you could receive up to \$5 an acre with 706 acre maximum. If you proceed to phase 2, producers

would have to adapt one climate smart activity and would be eligible for up to \$35 an acre for up to 706 acres. Another requirement request is that the landowner sign a disclosure saying that they will not receive a duplicate payment for the same climate smart activities. Chairman Garber suggested that we send notification out to districts to make them aware of this possible issue. Mr. Breaux asked Ms. Voorhies to assist with composing something for the districts.

OSWC Staff- Mr. Joey Breaux, LDAF-OSWC / Director

Mr. Breaux said the newest project that OSWC is working on is the limited cost-share reimbursement of poultry litter. This reimbursement was written into the 2020 319 workplan and has a cap of \$2,500 per program. The litter would have to be moved out of the HUC 8 watershed that it originated in. Producers will also be encouraged to create a nutrient management plan at their earliest convenience. During the beginning stages, they will be asked to complete a check list that will be based on a current solid waste BMP template that will make sure that they are land applying in a timely manner and staging it in the correct area. Land application rates that exceed 2 acres should be based on litter analysis, soil analysis, and land use or commodity specific nutrient management. Districts will process the payments as applications are received and approved by OSWC. District offices could also charge an administrative fee for payment processing. Chairman Garber asked Commission members to prepare to discuss the Commission goals list during the next board meeting so that districts can start planning to request more funding in the future. Mr. Breaux mentioned that OSWC created a new training module to explain the differences between SWCC, LACD, and OSWC which was presented recently during the Area 2 meeting. Mr. Breaux also advised the members that we should also begin discussions on the LACD Mid-Year meeting which happens in September.
