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# P.O.S.T FIREARMS QUALIFICATIONS 1 2 3 Whereupon, 4 This special meeting of the Municipal Police Officers' Supplemental Pay Board of Review was held in response to a 5 letter received from Roddy Devall, Chief, Hammond Police 6 Department in regards to firearms qualifications and State 7 8 supplemental pay. 9 MS. ROBERTS: 10 11 Does it say that you have to carry a firearm? 12 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: Only for that one position, it says "bear arms," because 13 that's the thing, there are so many other positions that you 14 can qualify under. See, number one, says "bearing arms," so 15 16 you would have to. MS. LEBOEUF: 17 18 And what position is that, or does it spell it out? 19 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 20 That's a general position. It doesn't say anything --21 MS. TAYLOR: That is in you all's -- or it's the statute? 22 23 MS. ROBERTS: I want to know if there is anything that says --24 25 MR. SCHEXNAYDER:

There's another statute that deals with supervision, so anybody who supervises, there is no "bearing arms" requirement, and the next one that is another -- just a general duly-commissioned law enforcement officer providing necessary services --

#### MR. WERTZ:

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There's a fine line there, and that's why I'm reading this letter from the chief, and the fine line is, it's not that P.O.S.T. requires you to carry a firearm, but if your duties include the power of arrest and to carry out warrants and stuff like that, then you are required by law to be certified as a peace officer, unless you're like an agency head, and if you are, then the P.O.S.T. Council comes right behind that and says you've got to qualify with your firearms once a year. You may not be carrying firearms, but a lot of it depends -- I suspect, depends on the job duties, and if it -- particularly like with these guys here, and ladies, with this department is, what does their job description require? And if it requires them to carry out duties that are similar to those of a peace officer, that is, they have the power of arrest, they are commissioned to do that, they can serve warrants, enforce traffic laws, et cetera, if they meet that, they're required by State law to be certified, and then the Council requires them to be qualified with firearms. they're not necessarily off the hook just because they don't

want them to carry firearms.

If they -- let's say, they made the decision not to carry firearms, that's fine, but if they're going to remain with the power to make arrests and stuff, then they're still peace officers, not because they say they're not, they're still peace officers the way it's stated in the law.

## MS. TAYLOR:

By definition.

#### MR. WERTZ:

Exactly. And that's the overriding concern there.

So the big question I probably have for the chief, he doesn't say that, but one of my questions is, because the administration is not requiring them to carry a firearm, okay, but are they still requiring them to have the powers of a peace officer? In other words, could they -- are they going to be commissioned to have the power to make arrests, et cetera, et cetera, because if they are, then they are peace officers, and so on. If they're not and they're not going to have the power of a peace officer, then they're not a peace officer.

### MS. LEBOEUF:

Well, that may be what we can hang our hats on. I mean, that may be the key depending on what he comes back with.

### MS. HUTCHINSON:

The definition.

## 1 MS. LEBOEUF: 2 Yes, the true definition in the statute of a peace 3 officer. MR. WERTZ: 4 5 And just because they don't want them to carry firearm doesn't let them off the hook from qualifying with 6 7 firearms. 8 MS. LEBOEUF: 9 Right. 10 MR. WERTZ: 11 As long as they are considered -- because they have the 12 power of arrest, given that they have those, then they've got 13 to qualify with firearms. They've got to qualify with 14 firearms even if they're not issued a firearm. 15 MS. TAYLOR: A perfect example would be DARE officers. 16 DARE officers are not allowed to carry --17 18 MR. LAYRISSON: 19 -- the P.O.S.T. requirement, because one of the 20 requirements is, you have to be a commissioned police officer. 21 MS. TAYLOR: 22 Right. 23 MR. LAYRISSON: 24 So, in order for supplemental pay -- if order for them to 25 qualify, first, they had to submit their training, they had to

send us a copy that they went to the P.O.S.T. Academy, and we 1 had to have a copy of their commission card saying they are a 2 police officer. And in the cases you're talking about where 3 you may be a communications officer and you're a civilian, 4 then you won't have that commission card. 5 6 MR. WERTZ: 7 They won't, and qualifying with firearms or not doesn't 8 matter. 9 MS. TAYLOR: 10 Right. MR. WERTZ: 11 12 If they are commissioned, they've got to qualify with somebody's firearm, and they've got to do it, that's required, 13 14 whether they carry one or not. MS. TAYLOR: 15 Right. Like I said, with DARE officers, they're not 16 allowed to carry firearms in the schools, but they're still 17 peace officers. They are required to be peace officers to be 18 19 eligible to be DARE officers. So they still have to qualify,

I think what it's going to come down to, in this situation, is just because you have a position that you say, as a chief, I will allow you to attend the P.O.S.T. Academy, that does not mean that that position is a peace officer position.

whether they're carrying their firearm or not.

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### MS. LEBOEUF:

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2 | Correct, correct.

## MS. TAYLOR:

You -- and I'm not talking about this chief specifically, because I don't know this guy. I'm not saying anything, you know, bad against him, but what it is, is that they -- anybody -- and you know, you have a turnover in communications and you want to give them that carrot of that supplemental pay to keep them and so you let them go to the Academy -- you commission them, you let them go to the Academy so they'll stay on because they'll get, you know, extra money, but there is no reason for them to go because they're not doing anything -their job is not the job of a peace officer. They're not -you know, they don't fit the definition. The job description doesn't fit the definition, and simply because they work for a law enforcement agency and sign a commission, it makes them eligible to attend the Academy, and just because you have a P.O.S.T. certificate doesn't necessarily mean that you're doing anything with it.

#### MR. LAYRISSON:

Well, in this case -- I'm not familiar with civil service, but in this case, they're civil service, so their position will tell you whether they are a civilian or whether they are a peace officer, under their charter.

#### MS. TAYLOR:

1 Right. And just because they hold a P.O.S.T. certificate doesn't change their job description. 2 3 MR. LAYRISSON: The other point I want to bring up too is, is I don't 4 want to see employees getting punished because you make me a 5 6 captain, and in my civil service deal, the new chiefs appointed by the mayor and he gets to pick an administrative 7 assistant, that position may not require someone to carry a 8 9 firearm, but you get promoted up, you should still get supplemental pay at that point. And just because a job 10 description during the day may not require them to carry a 11 12 firearm, you know, they are still peace officers in the community, so it's --13 14 MS. TAYLOR: 15 Right, and working details and things like that, right. MR. LAYRISSON: 16 17 -- they're working details and going to emergencies.

-- they're working details and going to emergencies.

They're out making arrests, and -- you know, I think it all falls back to, if they go to the Academy and then they have to qualify every year, if the city wants to take their firearms, then that's on the city and they lose their P.O.S.T.

MS. TAYLOR:

Right.

24 MR. WERTZ:

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I just want to -- a State agency, say, supplemental pay

wasn't the issue, but the bottom line kept coming back to, are 1 these guys going to have the power of arrest, or do you just 2 3 want them to be peace officers? Well, we're commissioning them, but I come right back, are they going to have the power 4 of arrest, because if they're not, then you're in a different 5 direction. That's ultimately what it got down to that --6 that's why I said, initially, that's the fine line here. It 7 ultimately is, do they have the power of arrest and -- because 8 9 if they don't, they're not a peace officer. If they do, whether they carry a firearm doesn't mean anything to us, as 10 Rebecca pointed out --11 12 MR. LAYRISSON: And job positions and job descriptions are going to 13 change throughout someone's career. 14 15 MS. TAYLOR: Right. I agree with you. 16 17 MR. LAYRISSON: But they're still a peace officer. They may be promoted 18 to an office captain. 19 20 MS. TAYLOR: I completely agree with you 110 percent, just because 21 you're not carrying a gun on a daily basis does not mean that 22 23 you don't have to qualify with one. MR. LAYRISSON: 24 25 You've got to get the P.O.S.T. training, qualifications,

1 recertification. 2 MS. TAYLOR: If that department decided to allow you to become 3 P.O.S.T. certified, then that -- you can't just do pieces and 4 parts. You've got to do the whole -- if you want the 5 certification, you want the supplemental pay, then you have to 6 meet all of the requirements of P.O.S.T., regardless of what 7 your daily duties are. Is that what you're saying? 8 MR. LAYRISSON: 9 10 That's what I'm saying. MS. TAYLOR: 11 12 Yes. I agree with you. 13 MR. WERTZ: And that is what we told the chiefs, as well, who would 14 15 go through -- they're not required by law to be -- because they are the head of an agency, they're not required to be 16 P.O.S.T. certified, but for supplemental pay purposes --17 18 MS. TAYLOR: It's a requirement. 19 20 MR. WERTZ: -- it's a requirement, and they go through the Academy. 21 Well, we've told them, if you're doing that, you've still got 22 to qualify with a firearms, as well, as a chief to maintain --23 24 if you want to maintain your certification.

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MR. LAYRISSON:

I'm shocked that you all don't have that enforcement. 1 I'm walking in here today, and I'm shocked that if I don't 2 qualify with my firearm, you can't take my supplemental pay. 3 I'm just --4 MR. WERTZ: 5 6 It's not an issue --MS. TAYLOR: 7 We can't even take your P.O.S.T. certification. 8 9 MS. LEBOEUF: If they can't take your P.O.S.T. certification, we 10 11 can't take stop your supplemental pay, right? 12 MR. WERTZ: We can't take your certification. All we do is say, the 13 14 certification, as a chief, it's still valid because you've met all of the requirements that the P.O.S.T. Council has laid 15 out, that's all. 16 17 MS. TAYLOR: The only thing that we ever really can kind of pass along 18 is, you know, this whole idea of vicarious liability, that's 19 20 the only thing we can do. If we're made aware of a department that is not meeting the requirements for firearms 21 22 qualifications, then we have a P.O.S.T. Council member, like, 23 you know, one of their, you know, counterparts or a Sheriff or a chief or a D.A. calling them up and go, look, we understand 24 25 that we can't pull their certification, we can't affect their

supplemental pay, but you're opening yourself up to liability 1 if these people are not qualifying, because you're operating 2 outside of the law, period, and that's the only thing we can 3 do now, that's all we can do. 4 MR. LAYRISSON: 5 We need to change some legislation. If we can try to get 6 7 into their pocket, they --MS. TAYLOR: 8 9 Yes. 10 MR. WERTZ: And we've had one or two of them tell us that the 11 insurance companies now are smart enough. They're starting to 12 check a lot of the departments, and if they're certified, it's 13 14 like --15 MS. LEBOEUF: 16 Do they not even ask their own attorneys? 17 MR. WERTZ: Well, they don't want to -- the insurance companies to 18 check them, because they don't want to -- you know, if someone 19 20 writes the coverage and find out they're delinquent, and then they're exposed and they're vulnerable to some high payout. 21 In the past, they may have looked the other way, not 22 23 necessarily anymore. MS. ROBERTS: 24

This isn't just a few people. We are getting lots of

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phone calls for these people who cannot requalify. I don't --1 2 and I'm putting them in positions. They are taking their guns from them, and they're putting them at the desk. 3 from Lake Charles right now. 4 MR. LAYRISSON: 5 If you can't requalify, you should not get supplemental 6 7 pay, and this is coming from a police chief, and I know there are ones out there trying to --8 9 MS. LEBOEUF: 10 Yes. MR. LAYRISSON: 11 -- do -- but if you cannot requalify every year with a 12 13 firearm, in my opinion, you're out, no discussion. 14 MS. LEBOEUF: 15 I'm with you. (Off-the-record discussion.) 16 17 MS. TAYLOR: 18 We have a couple of departments that are -- annual required, they have to bring all of their stuff with them. 19 They say, if you don't pass your qualification, you go home in 20 your underwear, yes, until you can get qualified, which that's 21 22 what we like to hear, that's what we want, but that's not the 23 majority. MR. WERTZ: 24 It's the risk part, the insurance, that's the part

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that's --1 2 MS. ROBERTS: 3 I don't think the little towns care, do you? MS. TAYLOR: 4 5 Some of them do, and some of them don't, to tell you the 6 truth, and, I mean, it depends on whether the chief is elected 7 or appointed. MS. ROBERTS: 8 9 And they're wanting to get the \$500. You would not believe the calls I get wanting to know -- okay. 10 They will 11 ask me, okay, I have to get P.O.S.T. certified, and once I get 12 P.O.S.T. certified, I get my money, and -- can I go to another position? They will straight up ask me that, can I go to a 13 14 desk, can I go to this? I mean, it's unreal. They just want the money, the \$500. 15 16 MS. LEBOEUF: 17 Yes. 18 MS. ROBERTS: 19 Can I work 20 hours a week? It's all unbelievable. 20 MS. TAYLOR: And we get the same thing on our end, people wanting 21 22 waivers of all of our requirements just so they can get 23 supplemental pay. 24 MR. WERTZ: 25 And the P.O.S.T. Council is pretty clear about whether

1 it's full-time, because they don't have -- there is no control 2 over reserves or part-timers as far as the P.O.S.T. Council is concerned, except to the extent of qualification of firearms, 3 because the law was changed to require that everybody get 4 firearms qualified. And so when there is any doubt, the 5 6 Council in the past has asked for a copy of their pay stub to determine whether they were full or part-time. 7 MS. ROBERTS: 8 9 What do you all consider full-time? 10 MS. TAYLOR: 11 We don't define it. 12 MS. ROBERTS: 13 Okay. Because --14 MS. TAYLOR: 15 We don't define it. The departments define it. MR. WERTZ: 16 17 It's however the --18 MS. TAYLOR: 19 However they classify them, we accept it. 20 MS. ROBERTS: 21 Okay. Well, I talked to a town this morning who was 22 trying to get supplemental pay, and they basically told me 23 that, we have a guy that is -- he's going to school and he comes in. Sometimes he works 40 hours a month or 60 or 24 25 whatever.

               They said, oh, he has to be paid? They're wanting

    MS. LEBOEUF:
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         Would you, please, read the statute?
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    MR. LAYRISSON:
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         Are they going to give the guy $500, or they just want
    the $500 --
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    MS. ROBERTS:
         They want us to -- they wanted us to pay him supplemental
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    pay, but they weren't paying him. I said, first of all, he's
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    has to make minimum wage.
    MR. LAYRISSON:
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          If he's not being paid, then there's nothing to
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    supplement.
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    MS. HUTCHINSON:
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         Yes.
    MS. LEBOEUF:
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         Exactly.
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    MS. ROBERTS:
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          They --
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          (Off-the-record discussion.)
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    MS. LEBOEUF:
          I think we're back to square one. I don't --
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    MR. LAYRISSON:
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I know I am brand new, but the very first question on 1 this one from Hammond -- communications officers and 2 corrections officers that are P.O.S.T. certified and carry 3 firearms, you know -- fails to qualify with their firearm 4 annually, does this effect -- absolutely. No matter what a 5 position, in my opinion, if they don't qualify annually, 6 7 they're not eligible. 8 MS. TAYLOR: And that's a decision that you all have to make, 9 regardless of what --10 11 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: The law says "P.O.S.T. certified," and they're saying 12 they're still P.O.S.T. certified, so we don't have the 13 14 authority to take it away. MS. LEBOEUF: 15 16 Exactly, that's where we are. MR. LAYRISSON: 17 I would argue that they're not P.O.S.T. certified if 18 19 they're not qualified annually. They may have received their 20 certificate, they may have been P.O.S.T. certified at one time, but is their certificate valid? 21 22 MS. TAYLOR: 23 We don't have the authority to say that a P.O.S.T. certificate is invalid simply because they have not 24 25 successfully qualified with firearms. The only time that we

will say a certificate is invalid is if they have had more 1 2 than a five-year break in service, that's the only time we 3 will become involved, as of now. MS. ROBERTS: 4 5 So, basically, they're staying in these same positions, they're just taking their guns away from them, and letting 6 7 them do whatever without a gun? MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 8 9 It says, we're considering that, and then when he followed up with his answer, he just gives us a whole bunch of 10 11 positions, and he doesn't --12 MS. LEBOEUF: It's a bunch of ca-ca. 13 14 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 15 So now we've got to bring them in and ask them more 16 questions. MS. LEBOEUF: 17 18 Yes. MR. TAYLOR: 19 20 Is it that they can't qualify; is that why he's wanting 21 to do this, is because they're not -- are they not shooting 22 the minimum score? 23 MS. ROBERTS: They can't pass. 24 25 Do they do their own training; does Hammond --

## 1 MS. TAYLOR: Yes. 2 3 MS. ROBERTS: And obviously, they're -- this Glen Hauck (phonetic), I 4 think he's the person I've been talking to. I don't know if 5 6 he knows they can't pass, that's what I'm gathering. MS. LEBOEUF: 7 Well, they passed it once. Why can't they pass it again? 8 9 MS. TAYLOR: Well, they've passed it more than once. In the Academy, 10 they have probably -- Hammond probably got right at 80 to 100 11 12 hours in firearms training in the Academy, and in the Academy, they have to qualify four times to be able to -- to even be 13 14 eligible to take a test. MS. LEBOEUF: 15 And do you qualify them again, or do you use that --16 17 MS. TAYLOR: We have firearms instructors who have to qualify them 18 19 every year. MS. LEBOEUF: 20 Right. So they qualify again with you before you issue 21 22 their certification? 23 MS. TAYLOR: They qualify with the firearms instructors, 24 Oh, yes. 25 they report that. We issue a card to every officer every

1	year. And Hammond has got	
2	MS. LEBOEUF:	
3	Well, it could be years before they start qualifying for	
4	all we know.	
5	MR. TAYLOR:	
6	I know Hammond has firearm instructors, Terry LeGuedo	
7	(phonetic) and Brad McCormick.	
8	MS. ROBERTS:	
9	Once they pass the first time, the next time they have to	
10	pass again is in a year?	
11	MS. TAYLOR:	
12	Uh-huh.	
13	MR. LAYRISSON:	
14	Within 13 months. That's what I'm saying, the	
15	legislation or whatever we've got to get passed, it's got to	
16	say, if you don't requalify in 13 months, you're not eligible	
17	your P.O.S.T. certificate is invalid and you're not	
18	eligible for supplemental pay, that would alleviate a lot of	
19	these problems.	
20	MS. ROBERTS:	
21	Right.	
22	MS. LEBOEUF:	
23	Are you going as far as saying that, the 13 months, and	
24	if you're not, your P.O.S.T. certification is	
25	MS TAYLOR:	

On July 1st, all the 13 months is going to do is their firearms qualifications will be invalid, and what the 30-day grace period means for them, as long as they qualify every year, they just have to go out and shoot the course one time and meet the minimum score or better. MS. LEBOEUF: Right, right. MS. TAYLOR: If they go over 13 months, if they go past, you know, 13 months since their last shot, then they have to complete further training. They have to go through classroom and shoot the course four times. It's a whole --MS. LEBOEUF: Until the Council says that your P.O.S.T. certification is invalid --MS. TAYLOR: Because you have not qualified --MS. LEBOEUF: -- then we can't do anything. MR. LAYRISSON: Right now, we might have a 20-year veteran who hasn't qualified in 19 years and is still getting supplemental pay. MS. LEBOEUF: That's right, that's correct. MS. TAYLOR:

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1 I quarantee you, you have that. 2 MS. LEBOEUF: 3 I feel certain, but if you don't have the power to say --4 to --MS. TAYLOR: 5 6 They have the power. They just haven't done it yet. 7 MS. LEBOEUF: Well, yes, but there's nothing in statute or in law that 8 9 says, if you don't pass a piece of this, your P.O.S.T. certification becomes invalid, so, therefore, you pull it --10 11 MS. TAYLOR: 12 Title 22 is the only thing that states -- the only thing that causes your certification to become invalid is 13 a more than five-year break in service. 14 15 MS. LEBOEUF: 16 Yes. 17 MS. ROBERTS: But you all keep -- you said you do keep a list of who is 18 19 not current with firearms? 20 MS. TAYLOR: You can call me and give me somebody's name, and I can 21 22 tell you whether or not they're qualified. MS. ROBERTS: 23 Do you think there's many people who are out there that 24 25 aren't?

# 1 MS. TAYLOR: 2 There is not as many as there used to be because of you all and Ms. Brenda over at the Sheriff's place cracking down 3 on these and checking on it. You all are getting more -- you 4 know, it's not just this -- when I first came into P.O.S.T., 5 6 it was just a signature and that was enough, you know. 7 not that way anymore, and so I think it's getting better. It's getting better, and the -- it's not going to take but one 8 9 big, fat lawsuit to fix all of it. 10 MS. LEBOEUF: 11 We don't want to be in the middle of a lawsuit. MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 12 13 We won't have -- we're just doing --14 MS. LEBOEUF: 15 You're right, but if we say no -- well, if we say no, it's on Hammond. I mean, if we say -- I don't know what we 16 17 can say. 18 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 19 All we can say is supplemental pay is going to continue 20 to be paid, unless we find out their P.O.S.T. certifications are invalid. 21 MS. LEBOEUF: 2.2 Yes. 23 I don't think we can say any more than that. 24 MR. SCHEXNAYDER:

His second sentence about considering taking away

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No.

firearms, he didn't follow that up with a response. 1 2 MS. LEBOEUF: No, he did not. He did not. 4 MR. LAYRISSON: 5 Can we not say that P.O.S.T. requires that you recertify 6 within that 18-month period, if you don't requalify, you may 7 not be eligible? I mean, we can't say we're going to stop your pay, but I don't think we should just tell them yes. 8 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 9 10 Well, you're going out on a limb. 11 MR. LAYRISSON: 12 We can state the law without telling them we don't have a 13 way to enforce it, maybe that would help encourage the chief in his decision. Like you said, he hasn't made a decision, 14 15 yet --16 MS. TAYLOR: 17 I mean, you can tell him what you're going to tell them, 18 and then follow it up with, you know, P.O.S.T. certified 19 officers are required -- I mean, I don't know. 20 MS. LEBOEUF: 21 Has that ever come up on the Sheriff's, where they wanted 22 to take away their firearms? 23 MS. HUTCHINSON: 24 I don't know.

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MR. LAYRISSON:

1	I have an employee now who is a communications officer
2	who is scheduled to retire in April with 25 years. I promise
3	you, she hasn't shot in 24 years. Now, she and I don't
4	even think she went to P.O.S.T
5	MS. ROBERTS:
6	She was grandfathered in?
7	MR. LAYRISSON:
8	was grandfathered in.
9	MS. ROBERTS:
10	Do the grandfather people, do they have to qualify?
11	MS. TAYLOR:
12	Who?
13	MS. ROBERTS:
14	The grandfather people?
15	MS. TAYLOR:
16	Yes. Grandfather has the same rights, privileges,
17	requirements, everything.
18	MR. WERTZ:
19	They have to.
20	MS. TAYLOR:
21	Yes. I mean, that's in Title 40 and Title 22.
22	MR. LAYRISSON:
23	So what do you say, Mr. Paul?
24	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
25	I say we bring them in, talk to them.

(Off-the-record discussion.)

### MS. TAYLOR:

I can tell you all, from my experience, our firearms instructors -- or Louisiana P.O.S.T. firearms instructors, are very highly trained in their skills, and I know Louisiana is on the bottom of a lot of lists, but firearms qualifications is not one of them. It is not one of them. Our firearms instructors have to meet extremely high standards. They have to stay at that standard every year. I mean, they requalify -- it's two days of training and shooting that they do to requalify, so I know that they know what they're doing.

And in this particular instance, they have P.O.S.T. firearms instructors who are -- they have one I know that has been a firearms instructor for 10-plus years, and Southeastern has firearms instructors. So, I mean, right there, they've got -- I don't know why they would have an employee that couldn't requalify.

### MS. LEBOEUF:

Yes, I know what you're saying.

## MS. TAYLOR:

From what I know about my firearms instructors, we have 524 of them in the state, and from what I know about the training that we give them, they can get it to the point where somebody can qualify, and if they qualified in the Academy, they can qualify every year.

1	MR.	LAYRISSON:
2		Yes, but I guarantee you some of these haven't been to
3	the	Academy in 20 years, and I bet that what has happened on
4	some	e of these on this list can't qualify anymore.
5	MS.	LEBOEUF:
6		Yes.
7	MR.	LAYRISSON:
8		And the ones that are qualifying are raising cane
9	MS.	LEBOEUF:
10		Probably.
11	MR.	LAYRISSON:
12	why do we have to qualify and	
13	MS.	LEBOEUF:
14	And they don't.	
15	MR.	LAYRISSON:
16		they don't, and they're still getting their pay.
17	MS.	LEBOEUF:
18		Yes.
19	MR.	LAYRISSON:
20		And then the chief can save thousands of dollars because
21	all	of these don't have to shoot. They don't have to buy new
22	guns	s because they can give all of these guns to the new hires.
23	MS.	LEBOEUF:
24		It will be interesting to see what he has to say, but he
25	does	sn't have to bring all these people with him, not all these

people anyway. 1 2 MS. ROBERTS: I think it will be just Chief Devall and Lieutenant 3 Hauck, are the two that I've been communicating with. 4 MS. LEBOEUF: 5 Okay. So do we tell them just to come to the meeting and 6 we have our questions we want to have answered, or do we send 7 a letter and say --8 9 (Off-the-record discussion.) 10 MS. HUTCHINSON: In our guidelines, we can't just say that -- like in our 11 guidelines, we can't like just be specific and say that, if 12 you don't pass firearms, as one of our guidelines, we don't 13 14 consider you eligible for supplemental pay? MS. TAYLOR: 15 That's what I talked to Chief LeDuff about, is that, 16 until we have that requirement, your Board and you all set 17 your own list of requirements to receive supplemental pay, and 18 if P.O.S.T. certification is one of those requirements, 19 P.O.S.T. firearms qualifications can be another one of those 20 requirements, and you just add it to your list. 21 22 MS. LEBOEUF: 23 We could do that. 24 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: But you'd have to do it by statute. 25

1	MS. LEBOEUF:
2	I know that, but it could
3	MS. TAYLOR:
4	We don't have anything to do with supplemental pay.
5	MR. LAYRISSON:
6	Well, in P.O.S.T., it says right here that you must
7	qualify annually and get a score of 80.
8	MS. TAYLOR:
9	Right. But there's nothing that follows that that says,
LO	if you don't, this is what we can do to you, that's where we
L1	run into our problems. They call us the snarling dog with no
L2	teeth, because that's what we are.
L3	MS. ROBERTS:
L 4	I just always remember when I first came to work here,
L5	Kay made sure she always used to preach about, they have to
16	be duly commissioned and have power of arrest. How can these
L7	people have power of arrest when they can't carry a gun to
18	arrest anybody?
19	MS. LEBOEUF:
20	Well, that's what he has to tell us, that's another
21	issue.
22	MS. TAYLOR:
23	If their commission does not include the power of arrest,
24	then they are not in a peace officer position, so they would
25	not be eligible, period.

# MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 1 You don't necessarily need to have a gun to arrest 2 somebody. You can -- a police officer can arrest somebody --3 (Off-the-record discussion.) 4 MR. LAYRISSON: 5 Well, I think the big picture is this, dealing with the 6 Hammond deal, if we don't have anything to enforce it, we 7 8 can't do anything with Hammond because we have to enforce it on everybody out there that's doing the same thing. 9 MS. ROBERTS: 10 11 Yes. 12 MR. LAYRISSON: However, I don't like the weak approach of telling them 13 it's okay. I say we call them in and say, you know, P.O.S.T. 14 requires everybody to shoot annually. If they don't, they may 15 lose their P.O.S.T., and in the meantime, hopefully, they can 16 get some legislation and --17 MS. TAYLOR: 18 19 And ours doesn't require legislation. 20 MS. HUTCHINSON: It doesn't require legislation. 21 MR. LAYRISSON: 22 23 Or whatever needs to do it. 24 MS. TAYLOR: It makes it easier on the Council, because the Council 25

can make a decision, and we put it directly into 1 2 administrative rule. We don't have to go through all that red 3 tape. MR. LAYRISSON: 4 5 And I don't think we have to go through all these positions, communications, whatever, just stick to the -- they 6 7 have to qualify, they have to be a commissioned police 8 officer. And just like these, they're wanting to know --9 Civil Service, and he's asking -- going to have to say are 10 they commissioned police officers or are they civilians. If 11 they're commissioned police officers, it doesn't matter what position they're in, because they're going to move. 12 MS. TAYLOR: 13 14 You asked them that, Susan, right, when they sent in for 15 whatever --16 MS. ROBERTS: 17 Yes. 18 MS. TAYLOR: 19 -- if they're not commissioned police officers, they 20 don't get it, regardless of whether or not they're P.O.S.T. 21 certified, right? 22 MS. ROBERTS: They have to send in, you know, a copy of their 23 Right. 24 card to show me that they're commissioned. Yes, that's a 25 requirement.

#### MR. WERTZ:

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And we're doing that. See, to get in the Academy, if you're not like with a police department or -- the normal, run-of-the-mill police department, Sheriff's department, if you're in one of these quasi, for lack of a better word, police agencies, let's say, an arson investigator at the local level, want to see a commission card, because, otherwise, you're just -- you might be just an enforcer who is carrying out the dictates of your commission or council, with no arrest authority, if you're not commissioned. They need that commission card to get into the Academy. No commission card, with, consequently, no power of arrest, so we tell them all -and we start with -- you know, we start with arson, public service, and the service commission investigators and so on, you know. To get in the Academy, show us that you've got the power of arrest, statutorily. If you don't have it, spell it out -- get it spelled out.

#### MS. LEBOEUF:

Let me ask this question. If they take away their firearms, whether they take them away for whatever reason or they're not qualified, whatever, and they no longer have arrest powers --

## MR. WERTZ:

They're not a peace officer.

## MS. LEBOEUF:

1	And they're not a peace officer, does that pull it; does
2	that pull their P.O.S.T. certification; does that revoke it?
3	MS. TAYLOR:
4	No. It starts their five years ticking. They've got to
5	have more than a five-year break in service.
6	MS. LEBOEUF:
7	Okay.
8	MR. LAYRISSON:
9	Do they get supplemental pay?
10	MS. TAYLOR:
11	I have no idea.
12	MS. LEBOEUF:
13	They're still P.O.S.T. certified, so until you pull that
14	P.O.S.T. certification, we can't pull their supplemental pay,
15	right?
16	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
17	Unless they're not duly commissioned.
18	MS. HUTCHINSON:
19	What if they're not a duly commissioned officer?
20	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
21	I don't know.
22	MS. LEBOEUF:
23	I mean, he could move them. He could move them into a
24	he could take away their firearm and move them into a
25	communication officer and take away

# 1 MR. LAYRISSON: If they're not commissioned, we can't be giving them 2 3 supplemental pay. 4 MS. ROBERTS: Will they be -- do we need to know if they're 5 6 commissioned officers still? 7 MR. LAYRISSON: I would say yes. 8 9 MS. LEBOEUF: 10 Yes. MR. LAYRISSON: 11 12 We'll see. Are they commissioned police officers, or are they civilian employees? 13 14 MR. WERTZ: 15 I have a question. On the warrant that they sign and send to you every month, does the chief certify that they --16 17 what are they certifying to? 18 MS. ROBERTS: That each of these individuals are eligible to receive 19 supplemental pay, that all the names listed on their roster 20 each one of them is eligible. You are signing your name 21 22 telling me to pay them, that they are all eligible. 23 (Off-the-record discussion.) 24 MR. LAYRISSON: 25 Just because he puts "police officer" there doesn't mean

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he's commissioned, though, just because he puts "correction"

    or "communication" doesn't mean they're commissioned officers,

    because I sign those forms every month.

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
