CALL TO ORDER 1 2 3 MR. LAYRISSON: 4 I would like to call this meeting to order on 5 September 4th, at 10:00 a.m. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING - JUNE 12, 2014 6 7 MR. LAYRISSON: 8 The first item on the agenda is the approval of the 9 minutes. 10 MS. LEBOEUF: 11 I will make a motion to approve the minutes. 12 MS. HUTCHINSON: 13 I'll second. 14 MR. LAYRISSON: 15 The motion carries. 16 OLD BUSINESS Sulphur Police Department - Melanie Burleson 17 Sulphur Police Department - Jennifer Young 18 19 MR. LAYRISSON: 20 The next item on the agenda under old business is 21 Sulphur Police Department, Ms. Melanie and Ms. Jennifer. 22 MS. BURLESON: 23 Good morning. 24 MR. LAYRISSON: 25 Good morning. Let's give the Board members just a

minute to read through their request. 1 2 MS. RYLAND: 3 I believe all the documentation has already been submitted and has been submitted. There's nothing new. 4 5 MR. LAYRISSON: Ladies, would you all like to comment on anything 6 before we render a decision on this? 7 8 MR. CRADDOCK: 9 T would. MR. LAYRISSON: 10 11 Yes, sir. Yes, you can speak. 12 MR. CRADDOCK: 13 Thank you. The last meeting, we basically left -- we left on the premise -- I'm sorry if I'm getting into again, 14 15 the right interpretation of paragraph D(1) of 2218.2, 16 basically, the punctuation in that paragraph, it only 17 referred to the secretaries, and the secretary was the impasse of the word. So, in sticking with that, I tried 18 19 -- one of the first things I did, I -- being a police 20 officer, (inaudible) somebody that's got more information 21 so I sought out an English teacher and asked her to read 22 that paragraph and tell me their interpretation of what 23 that punctuation in that paragraph meant. Other than the comments about a flowing-structured paragraph that all 24 25 English teachers will give you, she basically said that

1 that paragraph goes to great length to create a list and 2 at the end of the paragraph provides exceptions to that 3 list.

So, I mean, I followed up and brought the law to 4 other people to get their opinion on it, including one of 5 our District judges who is currently running for office, 6 and he read it and looked at me and he said, okay, tell me 7 8 why they're not entitled. This says they are. I said, well, that's what I'm asking you. He's busy running for 9 10 office, so I wasn't able to get an opinion from him because, you know with the politicians, they're not going 11 to commit. 12

But back to the term of "secretary," I also got with 13 the Office of the State Examiner. I had our 14 Representative contact the State Examiner to get a 15 reference on the Civil Service term "secretary." I didn't 16 want anybody to take my word for this, and I've got copies 17 if anybody wants to look, there basically is no 18 19 classification as a secretary in the Civil Service system, but there's -- there is a reference to a secretary, other 20 position, secretary to the police chief and secretary to 21 22 the fire chief, which if you go into the paragraph following or part of D(1), it mentions them specifically. 23 So, when you go back to the wording in D(1) of the 24 list, it causes the impression if the only position 25

1 available in Civil Service is secretary to the chief or 2 secretary to the fire chief, what secretaries might they 3 be talking about in that list, because there is no such 4 thing?

I believe it has a generic term was -- when we came 5 last time, you know, I don't know why somebody would write 6 a law and mention something that doesn't exist. I'm 7 guessing there may have been a position that existed at 8 that time. It's just my theory that maybe somebody was 9 offended by the term "secretary," and they came up with 10 something a little more generic or non-feminine or 11 non-masculine and came up with records clerk. Because if 12 13 you do the research on a records clerk, look it up in 14 Webster's, under "clerk," you'll find the synonym 15 "secretary." Under "secretary," you'll find the synonym 16 "clerk." They're basically one in the same. So, in keeping with all that and trying to get more 17 information, I'm still trying to find -- I got with two of

18 our local representatives, Senator Ronnie Jones and 19 20 Representative Mike Danahay, and asked them to look at it 21 and give me their opinion. And they were -- again, after 22 we had -- they looked at it, and we had the question posed why are they not entitled. Well, I'm looking at this, and 23 24 they both told us they felt they were entitled. So I 25 didn't have the answer for them. All I asked them, if

they agreed with us, to show their support, which they did. 1 2 They drafted a letter for the Board. It happened recently. I didn't make copies for everybody. The 3 4 statute, the intent was to be that -- to maintain the law -- them two was, in fact, a lawmaker so that's why they 5 proffered (phonetic). 6 7 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: I advise and I represent, but I don't make the 8 decision. If you want an opinion from me, I can write an 9 opinion or we can do a request to the Attorney General for 10 11 an opinion. 12 MR. CRADDOCK: 13 We do have a letter in to the Attorney General. It 14 also can come back and end up being nothing. 15 MR. LAYRISSON: Okay. That's very helpful. I think that would help 16 us in making our final decision. 17 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 18 Do you have a copy of the letter you sent to the 19 20 Attorney General? 21 MR. CRADDOCK: 22 I did not bring a copy. 23 MS. HUTCHINSON: 24 How was the question --25 MR. SCHEXNAYDER:

That would be very relevant. 1 MS. LEBOEUF: 2 And how they posed the question. 3 4 MR. HUTCHINSON: And how was the question posed. 5 6 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 7 Exactly. We would like to see how the issue was 8 presented. MR. LAYRISSON: 9 Yes. If you can get that letter sent to us. 10 MR. CRADDOCK: 11 12 Yes. 13 MS. HUTCHINSON: 14 I think we should still do one. 15 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 16 What's that? MS. HUTCHINSON: 17 18 Could you still do one to the Attorney General? 19 MR. LAYRISSON: 20 I think he'll want to see theirs first. 21 MS. HUTCHINSON: 22 Right. 23 MR. LAYRISSON: 24 And then decide if he wants to do one differently. 25 MR. SCHEXNAYDER:

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1 Exactly. MR. LAYRISSON: 2 3 So I would think, at this point, we will --4 MS. HUTCHINSON: I have another guestion. 5 Okay. So, Katie, clerical positions, do they receive 6 supplemental pay? 7 8 MS. RYLAND: 9 The only title is secretary to the police chief. MS. HUTCHINSON: 10 11 Okay. And a police records clerk, according to this, 12 says this class encompasses a responsible clerical 13 position. So, if this is a clerical position, they 14 wouldn't be eligible for supplemental pay. 15 MS. RYLAND: 16 Correct. MR. CRADDOCK: 17 18 You can see in the bottom paragraph, they provide 19 exceptions to that list. In the same paragraph, it 20 provides exceptions to the list created above, except those classified under Civil Service. 21 22 MR. LAYRISSON: 23 I would suggest we just leave everything as is until 24 we get the opinions from the Attorney General. Based on 25 that, we'll go from there. If they say you're eligible,

then absolutely you'll receive all your back pay. 1 2 MS. BURLESON: 3 Once we get that or whatever, when is the next meeting? 4 5 MR. LAYRISSON: We meet every quarter, so we don't know how long the 6 7 Attorney General will take. You all and us will just be at the mercy of the Attorney General for now. 8 MS. BURLESON: 9 Pretty much, whatever the Attorney General receives 10 that letter, it's --11 12 MR. LAYRISSON: 13 We're not going to argue with him. He's the number one lawyer in the state. 14 15 We would just like to see the letter so that we can contact them and send --16 17 MR. CRADDOCK: 18 Who will I send it to? MR. LAYRISSON: 19 You can just send it here. 20 MS. LEBOEUF: 21 22 You can e-mail it. It will be a lot faster. (Off-the-record discussion.) 23 MR. LAYRISSON: 24 25 We will take a quick recess.

(Brief recess.) 1 Mansfield Police Department - Frank Duson 2 MR. LAYRISSON: 3 The next item on the agenda is Mansfield Police 4 5 Department. MS. RYLAND: 6 Okay. At the last meeting, we brought this up as an 7 issue because on the warrant we had a job title change 8 from an administrative assistant and then to assistant 9 chief of police, so you had requested that we got the 10 11 breakdown of his job duties. This is what we received 12 back. 13 MS. HUTCHINSON: What does responding to calls for service mean? 14 15 MR. LAYRISSON: That means it's like being dispatched to a burglar 16 17 alarm or --18 MS. LEBOEUF: It's like a patrol deputy? 19 20 MR. LAYRISSON: 21 Like a patrol --MR. HUTCHINSON: 22 23 It should have said that. 24 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 25 Why can't people do that?

1	MR. LAYRISSON:
2	That's what you have me here for. I can educate you
3	on police terminology, because they speak a whole
4	different language.
5	MS. HUTCHINSON:
6	Calls for service?
7	MR. LAYRISSON:
8	Calls for service is legitimate, and what those
9	calls could be different from where you're at. In
10	Ponchatoula, we respond to calls for service for loose
11	pigs, and they respond for bad students.
12	What do you think on this one?
13	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
14	I think it's legit.
15	MR. LAYRISSON:
16	We're good, yes. I don't see any way we can ever
17	deny an assistant chief of police.
18	I need a motion.
19	MS. LEBOEUF:
20	I'll make a motion to approve Joseph Pratt for
21	supplemental pay.
22	MS. RYLAND:
23	We're going to put him back on effective the day that
24	his job title changed back to assistant chief of police.
25	MR. LAYRISSON:

1		Okay.
2	MS.	LEBOEUF:
3		Which it looks like the date in the letter, April
4	29t]	h?
5	MS.	RYLAND:
6		Correct.
7	MR.	LAYRISSON:
8		All right. We need a second.
9	MS.	HUTCHINSON:
10		I'll second.
11		NEW BUSINESS
12		Southern Univ. Police Department N.O.
13	MR.	LAYRISSON:
14		The next item on the agenda under new business,
15	Sou	thern University.
16	-	We'll give all Board members a minute to review this.
17	MS.	LEBOEUF:
18		This is new, correct?
19	MS.	RYLAND:
20		Yes.
21	MS.	LEBOEUF:
22		Okay.
23	MR.	LAYRISSON:
24		All right. Mr. Paul, are you ready to render your
25	opi	nion?

MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 1 I don't see any reason not to grant it, right offhand. 2 MS. HUTCHINSON: 3 4 They are campus police officers, right? MR. THOMAS: 5 That's correct. 6 7 MS. HUTCHINSON: You work for Southern University? 8 MR. THOMAS: 9 10 Yes. MS. HUTCHINSON: 11 12 Do other schools, State police officers are not 13 eligible, I do not think, so -- and because they assist -for example, the Southern-Baton Rouge Police assists -- do 14 15 they assist during big events with the -- you know, if 16 State Police are on campus or at LSU, I mean, I don't know how you would draw that line to say that because you 17 18 assist in these matters, even though you're -- and you're 19 headquartered there, I don't think that makes it that you 20 are no longer a Southern University employee, and I don't 21 think that campus police officers are eligible, but I 22 could be mistaken. 23 MR. LAYRISSON: 24 I think that this is another one that we probably, 25 since he's already doing one letter to the Attorney

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1	General, I would say let's request a second. I previously
2	met with the Chief, and I reviewed everything that he has
3	provided us. You know, they are police officers. They
4	I mean, just like anything else, but the first thing that
5	comes to my mind and why I would like an opinion is
6	because, if you'll look at our agenda, I think he's in the
7	wrong place, municipal police officers' supplemental pay.
8	MS. HUTCHINSON:
9	Where should he be?
10	MR. LAYRISSON:
11	Well, they're not I mean, everybody that we do is
12	a municipality. Like you said, we don't do Sheriffs. We
13	don't do any State agencies.
14	MS. HUTCHINSON:
15	They work for the university. I don't think they're
16	eligible. I don't know why we need an opinion.
17	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
18	I don't think we can
19	MR. LAYRISSON:
20	I would like to get the opinion as Chairman, just in
21	case we haven't been paying these guys and maybe the
22	Attorney General comes back and says we should be. I want
23	to at least give these officers the chance, and I always
24	want to be right, so I don't want to tell them "no" today
25	and the possibility of us being incorrect.

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So we're going to request an Attorney General opinion on you all's behalf.

3 MR. THOMAS:

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And, Mr. Chairman, good morning, and we appreciate the opportunity to come.

And just to respond to your question about assisting, 6 you know, we assist the police when called upon, but 7 that's not the essence of the work we perform. We respond 8 to calls for services, as well. We respond to flag-downs 9 by citizens when incidents occur in and around our campus 10 and the community. It's not just assisting the police, 11 but we also respond to calls for service. You know, the 12 -- we do our own warrants, you know. We investigate 13 crimes on and off campus. We are not the same as Southern 14 in Baton Rouge, because they are self-contained. We have 15 an open campus, and we have two located on -- in 16 Ponchartrain Park the south campus and the north campus, 17 18 and recently, we extended our school campus to the West Bank of the city of New Orleans, where we provide patrol 19 services over there, as well. To assist is a small 20 21 portion of what we do. 22 And as I said, my appreciation of the statute, I have spoken with the general counsel today to get his opinion 23 that the statute in looking at 2218.2, it says there that 24

every sworn commissioned law enforcement officer employed

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1	on a full-time basis by a bona fide police agency of the
2	state or its political subdivision, which is who we are.
3	It says, other than the Department of Public Safety and
4	Corrections and the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries.
5	Those are part of the statute that are exclusions. You
6	know, it doesn't exclude us. I mean, I recognize that no
7	other campus police has ever made this petition before
8	you, you know, and I think this doesn't preclude us from
9	doing so. Each campus should be able to, you know, if
10	they so choose, to make an argument for themselves for
11	approval because most campuses in the state are
12	self-contained. Everything that they do is on that
13	campus, and they don't go off of campus to do anything,
14	like we are situated. We provide all of those services to
15	the general public, not just our students and staff on a
16	single campus.
17	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
18	Now, you are still employed by Southern University,
19	right?
20	MR. THOMAS:
21	Correct.
22	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
23	So there is no municipality involved in this
24	MS. HUTCHINSON:
25	Correct.

MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 1 2 Well, I mean, I know you work in the city of New 3 Orleans, but you don't work for the City of New Orleans? MR. THOMAS: 4 Correct, but the statute says those agencies that are 5 6 headquartered in the city. 7 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 8 You're right, you're right, and you do fit in that. 9 I would think that's the crazy thing about this statute. 10 It's not all clear -- as clear as it could be. I don't 11 know what -- I think we're going to have to request the 12 opinion. I don't think we can just do it right here. 13 MR. THOMAS: 14 I appreciate it. 15 MR. LAYRISSON: 16 Your opinion is your best opportunity -- your only 17 opportunity. MS. HUTCHINSON: 18 19 Right. 20 MR. LAYRISSON: 21 Because these guys are ready to all tell you no. All 22 right. You all are welcome to stay for the remainder of 23 the meeting. 24 MR. THOMAS: 25 We're going to hightail it. Thank you very much.

1	MS.	LEBOUEF:
2		Have a good day. Thank you.
3		Saint Joseph Police Department - Mark Bruce
4	MR.	LAYRISSON:
5		The next item on the agenda is the Saint Joseph
6	Pol	ice Department.
7	MS.	RYLAND:
8		This is a new department.
9	MS.	LEBOEUF:
10		So they never had anybody before?
11	MS.	RYLAND:
12		Correct.
13	MS.	LAYRISSON:
14		Is this the chief?
15	MS.	HUTCHINSON:
16		Is this the only officer?
17	MS.	RYLAND:
18		No.
19	MS.	LEBOEUF :
20		Is he the chief?
21	MS.	RYLAND:
22		No. He's an officer.
23	MS.	LEBOEUF:
24		That's what I thought.
25	MR.	SCHEXNAYDER:

Do they have a chief? 1 2 MS. HUTCHINSON: 3 Right. Do they have a chief? 4 MS. RYLAND: 5 No. 6 MS. LEBOEUF: 7 No chief, no nothing, wow. Where is his -- 2012. How can it be new? 8 MS. BOUDREAUX: 9 10 He just became P.O.S.T. certified. 11 MS. LEBOEUF: 12 I see. 13 MR. LAYRISSON: 14 Do we not have a minimum on officers in a department? 15 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 16 A minimum? No. One is not enough. 17 MR. LAYRISSON: 18 No. 19 MS. HUTCHINSON: 20 Who does he answer to? 21 MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 22 That's true, but he's still got to be P.O.S.T. 23 certified. 24 MS. LEBOEUF: 25 He must answer to the mayor.

MS. HUTCHINSON: 1 2 Not all have to have a --3 MR. LAYRISSON: 4 It was probably a volunteer department. MR. SCHEXNAYDER: 5 They have those? 6 7 MR. LAYRISSON: 8 Uh-huh. MS. LEBOEUF: 9 Are we talking about Bruce, Mark Bruce? 10 MS. HUTCHINSON: 11 12 Yes. 13 MS. LEBOEUF: 14 Okay. I just didn't see it, that's all. I just 15 wanted to be sure. 16 MR. LAYRISSON: 17 His salary looks okay to me. He's P.O.S.T. 18 certified. I can't see any reason for him to be denied. 19 Anyone else? MS. LEBOEUF: 20 21 No. 22 MS. HUTCHINSON: 23 Sure can't. 24 I'll make a motion to approve the department of Saint 25 Joseph.

1 MS. LEBOEUF: 2 I'll second. As well as Mr. Bruce receiving supplemental pay, I'll second. 3 Central Police Department - Stephen Wallis 4 MR. LAYRISSON: 5 The next item on the agenda is the Central Police 6 7 Department. 8 MS. RYLAND: 9 This is also a new department. 10 MS. LEBOEUF: Do they have anybody currently receiving? 11 12 MS. RYLAND: 13 No. 14 MS. HUTCHINSON: 15 There's only one person for the Central --MS. RYLAND: 16 17 There is only one person that is employed. 18 MS. LEBOEUF: He's the assistant chief? 19 20 MS. RYLAND: 21 Yes. 22 MS. LEBOEUF: Not the chief? 23 24 MS. RYLAND: 25 Correct.

1	MS. LEBOEUF:
2	Do they not have a chief? I'm just curious.
3	MS. RYLAND:
4	They do have a chief.
5	MS. LEBOEUF:
6	Where is his application?
7	MS. RYLAND:
8	He's a volunteer.
9	MS. LEBOEUF:
10	Oh, I see. He's not paid. Okay.
11	There is his prior service.
12	MS. HUTCHINSON:
13	I'll make a motion to create the Central Police
14	Department, as well as supplemental pay for Stephen
15	Wallis.
16	MS. LEBOEUF:
17	I'll second.
18	Shreveport Police Department - Eric Alford
19	MR. LAYRISSON:
20	The next item on the agenda, the Shreveport Police
21	Department.
22	MS. RYLAND:
23	Okay. You will see this information for Eric Alford.
24	We brought this before the Board. This is a new issue of
25	military active duty for training.

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1	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
2	What's the problem? The statute says active duty.
3	So they're combining training with active duty. It's an
4	active duty for training. So we weren't we didn't want
5	to make that determination without the Board. We wanted
6	the Board to look at this.
7	MR. LAYRISSON:
8	The Chairman of the Board says we should always pay
9	our active duty military people.
10	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
11	Even if it's just for training?
12	MR. LAYRISSON:
13	He's there defending our country.
14	Now, there's a brand new statute that right from
15	this last session that what's that one? They don't
16	have to have the one year.
17	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
18	The one year, yes. If they get called out before
19	they finish the one year.
20	MS. LEBOEUF:
21	Okay.
22	MR. LAYRISSON:
23	What does this training involve?
24	MR. SCHEXNAYDER:
25	We don't know.

MS. LEBOEUF: 1 2 Active duty for training. 3 MR. LAYRISSON: I mean, I would think we would need to know if he was 4 5 required to go or if he chose to go. MS. RYLAND: 6 7 I don't think we can ask that. MS. LEBOEUF: 8 9 I don't know. Can we ask that? MR. LAYRISSON: 10 11 In my opinion, if they volunteered for it, then they may not be, but if they're required to, then we would have 12 13 to pay it. 14 MS. HUTCHINSON: 15 Right. Like, he was in the reserves -- and this is a 16 question. He was in the reserves and he's going to have to go for training, and so is that why he's saying active 17 duty? Because, if you think like reserves, they have to 18 19 go for the week, so does that mean you're on active duty 20 at that point? MR. LAYRISSON: 21 22 Yes. I mean, if you're called to go, yes. 23 MS. LEBOEUF: 24 Yes. 25 MS. HUTCHINSON:

1		Like, people that is one the reserves, you know, the
2	one	week in a month and two weeks in a year, so those two
3	weel	ks, then you're on active duty?
4	MR.	SCHEXNAYDER:
5		I don't know.
6	MS.	LEBOEUF:
7		He is requesting authorization for active duty
8	tra:	ining/active duty tour.
9	MR.	SCHEXNAYDER:
10		Again, down there it says active duty for training.
11	MS.	LEBOEUF:
12		I see that.
13	MR.	SCHEXNAYDER:
14		And it does say ordered to.
15	MR.	LAYRISSON:
16		It does say ordered to?
17	MS.	LEBOEUF:
18		Ordered to for 126 days.
19	MR.	SCHEXNAYDER:
20		Okay. I'm fine with it.
21	MS.	HUTCHINSON:
22		I'll make a motion to approve it.
23	MS.	LEBOEUF:
24		I'll second.
25	MS.	RYLAND:

1 So, in the future, should we receive any active duty 2 for training, should we just keep them on, or do you want 3 them to come before the Board?

4 MR. LAYRISSON:

I like -- as I said, we need to find out if it's 5 requested or if it's ordered. I think, in my opinion, 6 that's a big difference. Otherwise, a lot of them will 7 just start signing up for training and taking leave. If 8 it's the two weeks or if it's ordered training, in my 9 opinion, we should always pay them, if they don't have a 10 I mean, if -- whether you're reserve, any branch, 11 choice. 12 if they call and say you've got to report, you've got to report, so they should be paid, but we don't need a bunch 13 14 -- hey, chief, I'm going for six months, you know. Because we can't fire them even though they volunteer 15 16 signing up, we still have to keep their spot. 17 MS. BOUDREAUX: I agree if they send us their orders. 18 19 MS. LEBOEUF:

Or you can bring it before the Board. I mean, you know, like this one clearly states MBR, which I assume is him, is ordered to active duty for training. So that, to me, is going active duty, whether he's training or not, you know, they added that in there.

25 MS. HUTCHINSON:

1 Right. 2 MS. LEBOEUF: And it also says in the back -- I don't know what 3 4 member duty status, it says is 19. I don't know what that means because it doesn't help us any, but, I mean, that at 5 least would --6 MS. HUTCHINSON: 7 8 I think if you're ordered -- if you have orders, you 9 don't have to bring it --10 MR. LAYRISSON: Ask for that, and if they don't want to give you that 11 12 or it's unclear, put it on the agenda. 13 MS. RYLAND: 14 Okay. Got it. 15 MR. LAYRISSON: 16 Are you all okay with that? 17 MS.
