CALL TO ORDER

Board President, Mr. Gary Solomon, called the meeting to order at 5:05 p.m.

ROLL CALL

The roll was taken. There were nine members present. A quorum was present.

Mr. Carlos Zervigon made a motion to amend the agenda to add an action item on the Board Chair report dealing with the President/CEO compensation based on the Personnel Committee report. Ms. Janice Manuel seconded the motion. A vote was held. All were in favor. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Mr. Wood Delahoussaye moved to approve the NOCCA Board of Directors Meeting Minutes of March 26, 2025. Ms. Manuel seconded the motion. All were in favor. Motion carried.

STUDENT SERVICES

Ms. Prinsey Walker, Director of Community Engagement, described the success of Senior Saturday, Homecoming, Graduation and Celebration. The Homecoming event was the first ever. Mr. Blake Coheley, Director of Student Services and Admissions, shared a breakdown of how the required days in the school calendar are calculated, including the built-in margin of days to put back on the calendar if we lose days to weather, etc. Mr. Coheley also provided the 2024-25 EOY Enrollment Statistics showing that NOCCA was able to serve a total of 2,497 students in the following programs: Auditioned Students, 2024 Summer Off Campus Enrollment, Off-Campus Non-Credit Workshop Enrollment, and On Campus Non-Credit Workshop Enrollment. Dr. Joe Ricks asked if the Board could also see the parish-by-parish breakdown of all those programs in future presentations.

FINANCE AND HUMAN RESOURCES

Ms. Anna Schwab, Deputy CFO, reported that the budget was on pace for this time of year. Ms. Schwab also spoke of Operations Goals in the newly purchased Chevron Forum such as upgrading security to match the main campus, upgrading hardware and software in the HVAC systems, improvements in Science classrooms venting, and considering roll-down gating.

ARTS AND ACADEMICS (Dr. Kit Nelson and Ms. Kesha McKey)

Dr. Kit Nelson and Ms. Kesha McKey presented the Student and Parent Handbook for 2025-26. The Board was guided to the pages with updates from the previously approved handbook for review.

- Discussion ensued regarding wording of the dress code updates. Dr. Nelson and Ms. McKey agreed to update the verbiage being discussed.
- Mr. Solomon asked for the NOCCA Policy on Interactions with Law Enforcement and Immigration Authorities to be sent to the Board.
- Much discussion ensued regarding the updates to the Process for Reentry after a student has been
 recommended for expulsion. The board asked to revert to the prior, previously approved Process
 for Reentry to replace the updates, with the understanding that more time was needed to review
 the process.

Dr. Ricks made a motion to move to Executive Session. Mr. Mark-Anthony Thomas seconded the motion. A vote was held. All were in favor. Motion carried. The Executive Session started at 6:14 p.m. Mr. Delahoussaye motioned to return to Regular Session. Dr. Ricks seconded the motion. A vote was held. All were in favor. Motion carried. The Board moved back to Regular Session at 6:40 p.m.

Mr. Thomas motioned to approve the Student and Parent Handbook for 2025-26 with the following exceptions: 1) Give staff the prerogative to edit the second bullet to clarify the wording, and 2) the Process of Reentry will revert to current version prior to the updates. Ms. Robin Williams seconded the motion. A vote was held. All were in favor. Motion carried.

Dr. Nelson reported 100% graduation rate of NOCCA Academic Studio students and Ms. McKey reported a total of \$47 million in gift aid offers to NOCCA seniors.

NOCCA FOUNDATION

Mr. Adonis Rose was unable to attend.

BOARD PRESIDENT REPORT

Ms. Janice Manuel reported on the Personnel Committee meeting held just prior to this board meeting. The Committee met with Mr. Cooper to review the annual President/CEO Evaluations. They agreed to continue the conversation into the following year to develop some actionable steps.

Mr. Solomon explained that the President/CEO contract allows for adjustment to the compensation annually at the discretion of the Personnel Committee and the Board. following the President/CEO Evaluation review. The Personnel Committee recommended that Mr. Cooper's salary is increased by 3%,

commensurate with the salary increases of the full time faculty. Ms. Rachel Davis-Haley made a motion to increase Mr. Cooper's salary by 3% effective August 4, 2025. Dr. Ricks seconded the motion. A vote was held. All were in favor. Motion carried.

Mr. Solomon asked for a motion to approve the Board Resolution authorizing NOCCA to enter into a contract with Adams & Reese for legal services. Compensation for these services not to exceed \$50,000 for the period from July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2026. Mr. Delahoussaye motioned to authorize Mr. Solomon to enter into this contract with Adams & Reese. Ms. Davis-Haley seconded the motion. A vote was held. All were in favor. Motion carried.

PRESIDENT/CEO

Mr. Cooper spoke of the testimony he and Ms. Schwab made to Senate Finance and House Appropriations that was received very well by these committees. They received much positive feedback after the meeting.

Mr. Solomon asked for public comment. There was none.

Mr. Solomon asked for any closing remarks or other business. None was offered.

NOCCA Faculty Biographies 2025-26

NOCCA Arts Faculty Bios

Classical Instrumental

Hristo Birbochukov (Chair) is an Artist-Teacher in Applied Piano and Chair of the Classical Instrumental Department at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA). He also teaches graduate piano majors at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary (NOBTS) and serves as Co-Director and Faculty of the New Orleans Piano Institute (NOPI) and on the Board of Directors of the Musical Arts Society of New Orleans (MASNO). Praised for his "sensitivity" and "superb artistry" (Edward Lein, Intermezzo Concert Series), Birbochukov has performed widely in solo and collaborative concerts across Eastern Europe and the United States, including his New York debut recital in 2012. A prizewinner of national and international piano competitions, he has appeared with numerous orchestras and participated in international music festivals such as the International Festival for Contemporary Piano Music ppIANISSIMO (Sofia) and the International Festival of New Music (Florida). His performances have been broadcast on television and radio in Bulgaria and the U.S., and he has been featured in international publications, including the official website of BBC Music Magazine. A sought-after educator, Dr. Birbochukov has been named a Steinway & Sons Top Teacher (2017, 2018, 2024). Additional honors include the Albert Nelson Marquis Lifetime Achievement Award (2017), a quarterfinalist for the GRAMMY Music Educator Award (2017), listing as Pianist and Music Educator in Marquis Who's Who in America (2015-present), the Phi Kappa Phi Artist of the Year Award (2007), and the Tallahassee Music Guild Award (2005, 2007). Dr. Birbochukov has presented recitals and masterclasses at colleges and universities across the U.S., adjudicated competitions in both the United States and Eastern Europe, and his students have earned top prizes in state, regional, and national competitions and have been selected as finalists for NPR's From the Top. Josiah Bullach (Faculty) serves as Associate and Assistant Principal Horn of the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra. Since his appointment to the LPO in 2016, Josiah has played an active role as a performer, recording artist, and educator in the Greater New Orleans area. He is a faculty member at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts and is a member of several chamber groups, including the New Orleans Chamber Players, the LPO Hornsound, and Musaica. Beyond Louisiana, Josiah plays principal horn in the Pensacola Symphony Orchestra and has been a guest performer with the Mobile Symphony Orchestra, Cleveland Pops Orchestra, Cleveland City Chamber Orchestra, Gulf Coast Symphony Orchestra, Kentucky Symphony Orchestra, Firelands Symphony Orchestra, and WindSync. In 2022, he won Second Prize in the International Horn Competition of America. A native of Ohio, Josiah began taking horn lessons from his uncle Ron Kurzen at the age of eight. He then went on to receive his Bachelor of Music degree from the Baldwin Wallace University Conservatory of Music, where he studied with Jesse McCormick. He was a prize winner of the Tuesday Musical Association

Scholarship Competition, a featured soloist with the Cleveland Youth Wind Symphony for their 2012 European concert tour, and a soloist at both Baldwin Wallace University and the University of Cincinnati-College Conservatory of Music, where he continued graduate studies as a student of Randy Gardner. When not playing the horn, Josiah enjoys an active lifestyle of running, CrossFit, and neighborhood walks with his wife, Alli, and their dog.

Leslie Cain (Faculty) has been widely praised for her delicate touch, sense of color, and scholarly approach to interpretation at the keyboard. A native of Los Angeles, she completed her undergraduate studies at the Manhattan School of Music and earned her Doctorate of Musical Arts from the University of California, Santa Barbara. She also holds an undergraduate degree in Philosophy from California State University, Los Angeles, where she was named the department's Outstanding Undergraduate in her junior year. Her doctoral thesis, Ravel the Existentialist?, integrates these dual areas of expertise by using the philosophy of Jean-Paul Sartre as a new interpretive lens to examine the music and life of composer Maurice Ravel. Dr. Cain is a top prizewinner of numerous competitions, including the Music Teacher's National Association Senior Piano Competition, the Los Angeles International Liszt Competition, and the Cypress College Piano Competition. She was a member of UC Santa Barbara's prestigious fellowship ensemble, the Young Artist Quartet, and especially enjoys chamber music collaborations with string players. She has appeared in master classes with many of the world's foremost artists, including Murray Perahia, Jeremy Denk, and Yo-Yo Ma, and was one of six pianists invited by the Weill Music Institute to perform in Richard Goode's all-Debussy master class at Carnegie Hall, as part of the inaugural season of the Resnick Education Wing. Dr. Cain is also an alumna of the Conservatoire Américain, the renowned institute of music held each summer at the Château de Fontainebleau, France. Dr. Cain currently resides in New Orleans, Louisiana, where she holds a faculty appointment as Artist-Teacher at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts.

Zorica Dimova (Faculty) is originally from Bulgaria. She started playing the violin when she was 5 years old. At 9, she joined the Youth Orchestra with which she toured Europe and won various awards. Dimova graduated from the National Music Conservatory "Pancho Vladigerov" in Sofia, Bulgaria. She was featured as a soloist of the Symphony Orchestra in Stara Zagora and the State Academy Symphony Orchestra performing Mozart's Violin Concerto No.5, Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto in D major, and Brahms' Violin Concerto in D major. Before coming to the United States, Dimova was a member of the Bankya Chamber Orchestra and New Symphony Orchestra. She joined the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra in 2003. During the summers, Dimova played with the Missouri Symphony Orchestra and Music in the Mountains Music Festival. She also performed with the Illinois Symphony Orchestra, Orlando Philharmonic, and Nashville Symphony. Zorica is an active solo and chamber musician as well as an educator. She performs in collaboration with many different groups in the US and abroad and gives master classes. Dimova is on the faculty at NOCCA and a former lecturer at Southeastern Louisiana University, teaching applied violin/viola, chamber music, and orchestra repertoire. She also maintains private studios in Mandeville and New Orleans. Many of Dimova's students have won awards and scholarships from competitions, auditions, and music organizations such as National Youth Orchestra of the United States of America, Music Teachers National Association competition, Junior Philharmonic Society of New Orleans, Greater New Orleans Youth Orchestra Concerto competition, Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra Concerto Competition, Louisiana Music Teachers Association String Rally, Honors Performance Series at Carnegie Hall, Boston University Tanglewood Institute, Philadelphia International Music Festival. Dimova's students were accepted with full scholarships in the music programs of Oberlin Conservatory, Yale University, and

LSU. Zorica Dimova holds a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Violin and Viola Performance from Louisiana State University.

Creative Writing

Annell López (Chair) is the winner of the Louise Meriwether First Book Prize and the author of the short story collection I'll Give You a Reason, a finalist for the PEN/Robert W. Bingham Prize for best debut short story collection. Named a best short story collection of 2024 by Electric Literature, I'll Give You a Reason has been longlisted for the Maya Angelou Book Award, the Reforma Latinx Book Award, and the Clark Fiction Prize. Most recently, she was recognized as a Gambit's 40 under 40. López was a Peter Taylor Fellow at the Kenyon Review Workshops. Her work has appeared in Guernica, American Short Fiction, The Common, Brooklyn Rail, Refinery29, and TIME. López received her MFA from the University of New Orleans, where she was awarded the Joanna Leake Fiction Prize. Throughout her years in the classroom, López has been the recipient of multiple Teacher of the Year awards. In 2022, she received a New Orleans Excellence in Teaching Award.

Anne Gisleson (Faculty) is the author of *The Futilitarians* (Little, Brown), a San Francisco Chronicle Best Book of the Year. Her writing has appeared in *The Atlantic*, *Smithsonian Magazine*, *The Los Angeles Times*, *The Oxford American*, *The Believer*, and many other publications. Her essays have been featured in several anthologies such as *Best American Non-Required Reading*, *Airplane Reading*, *Life in the Wake*, and others. She co-edited and co-wrote *How to Rebuild a City: Field Guide from a Work in Progress*, about ground-up rebuilding efforts in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina, and her work has also appeared in several books of art and photography, most recently in Akasha Rabut's *Death Magick Abundance* and Cheryl Gerber's *Cherchez la Femme*. Her nonfiction book *Wild Iris* is forthcoming from LSU Press' Louisiana True series. She teaches at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts, the University of New Orleans MFA program, and is co-founder of the literary and visual arts non-profit Antenna.

E. Gross (Faculty) is a poet and interdisciplinary artist from New Orleans. They are the author of this body/that lightning show, selected by Jericho Brown for the Hilary Tham Capital Collection of The Word Works Press (2019), and DEAR ESCAPE ARTIST, a chapbook in collaboration with artist Sara White (Antenna 2016 and 2023). Their poem, "Ghazal at the end of the world", was selected by Beth Ann Fennelly as the Poetry Contest Winner for the Words and Music Festival in 2020 and appeared in the Peauxdunque Review. Other poems have appeared in Green Mountains Review, Painted Bride Quarterly, Fairy Tale Review, and a wide array of journals and anthologies. With collaborators Norah Lovell and Lee Deigaard, they create interdisciplinary installations as the LENs Collective. March 2025 saw the premiere of Medea as a lounge singer, their song cycle in collaboration with composer Tucker Fuller at the Toulouse Theatre. A NOCCA alum, they hold an MFA in Poetry from Hunter College of the City University of New York and a BA from Vassar College, and now teach Creative Writing at New Orleans Center for Creative Arts and English at Loyola University. They are currently developing a libretto about environmental activist orca whales.

Annalise Torcson (Faculty) is a short story writer, novelist, and poet. She holds an M. Phil in Irish Literature from Trinity College Dublin, as well as a Master's in Creative Writing from the University of Oxford. Her poetry and fiction have appeared in multiple publications, most recently *Poetry Ireland Review*, and her theatrical work has been staged at "Raze the Space's International Theater Project"

in Los Angeles. She was the recipient of Oxford's F.H. Pasby Prize and has been longlisted for the Disquiet Prize in Fiction and the Alpine Fellowship Prize in Poetry. She was also awarded a creative residency at Tulane University's "A Studio in the Woods" in recognition of her writing's relationship to the environment. She has been employed as a bookseller, and has interned at Copper Canyon Press in Port Townsend, Washington. She is currently at work on her debut novel, conducting interviews and research on the Pacific Northwest's "Timber Wars" of the 1980s and 1990s. She is an alumna of the Creative Writing program at NOCCA.

Andy Young (Faculty) grew up in southern West Virginia and has lived most of her adult life in New Orleans. A graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Warren Wilson's Program for Writers, her second full-length collection, *Museum of the Soon to Depart*, came out in October 2024 from Carnegie Mellon University Press. She has also made four chapbooks and two kids. She has won the Patricia Spears Jones Award, the Nazim Hikmet Award, and has been granted residencies in Virginia, Louisiana, Vermont, and Barcelona. She and her partner, Khaled Hegazzi, translate poems from Arabic that have been published in *Southern Review, Los Angeles Review of Books*, and the *Norton Anthology Language for a New Century*. Before teaching, she worked as a sushi waitress, bartender, bookseller, jar-filler in a pickle factory, journalist, transcriber, copyeditor, and voice actor. Her work has been translated into several languages, featured in classical and electronic music, in flamenco and modern dance performances, in an award-winning poetry film which she directed, and in jewelry, tattoos, and public buses.

Culinary Arts

Dana D'Anzi Tuohy (Chair) Chef Dana began working at the age of 13, just stocking products in a family friend's school supply store, but learning the important lessons of being on time, precise counting of inventory, and learning to communicate with customers. Her first foray into the food business was scooping ice cream at Häagen-Dazs during high school. After graduating from Ben Franklin HS, she quickly discovered that studying chemical engineering was not for her. Taking time away from college to uncover her passion, she secured a reservationist job at Commander's Palace. It was here that she fell in love with the restaurant business. It was also here that she met Chef Emeril Lagasse, who became her career mentor. Chef Dana traveled the country before returning to college at Johnson & Wales University to study Culinary Arts, earning an Associate's degree in Culinary and a Bachelor's degree in Restaurant & Hotel Management. It was at J&W as a teaching assistant and fellow that she discovered her love of teaching. Returning to New Orleans after graduating, Chef Dana started working for Chef Emeril at NOLA Restaurant. She quickly moved up the ranks at both NOLA and Emeril's. She moved to Las Vegas, continuing to work for Chef Emeril at Emeril's New Orleans Fish House and Delmonico Steakhouse, later becoming the company's first female chef at the steakhouse. As the company grew, so did Chef Dana's career, and she earned the position of Culinary Director of Chef Emeril's four restaurants in Las Vegas. After a successful career in the restaurant business and a wish to return home to be near family, she was tapped to become the Founding Department Chair of Culinary Arts at NOCCA. Coming home to New Orleans meant building a new home at NOCCA, where she has lived for the last 15 years, welcoming and graduating hundreds of students.

Jessie Wightkin Gelini (Faculty) is a native New Orleanian and an alumna of NOCCA's Dance Department. Chef Jessie's passion for food led her to study Culinary Anthropology at the University

of Alabama, where she explored the cultural stories behind cuisine. After Katrina, when Jessie returned home, she began working at the prestigious Commander's Palace, where she started as their shrimp peeler and after four years left as the Pastry Chef. Chef Jessie was also instrumental in the launching of the kitchen team at Bacchanal Wine, Company Burger, and Taceaux Loceaux food truck famously and fabulously appearing on Anthony Bourdain's "The Layover" slinging tacos! Passing on the traditions of her culinary roots is what Chef Jessie is most passionate about making the transition from the restaurant world to Culinary education a natural move. Her Culinary Teacher career began at Edible Schoolyard and led her back home to NOCCA. Chef Jessie continues to cook as a private chef and caterer, but her heart lies with education. A self-proclaimed Food Explorer, she is enthusiastic about traveling the world through food. Telling the stories of people, places, and ingredients, one plate at a time.

Kamili Hemphill (Faculty) brings over two decades of culinary experience spanning fine dining, recipe development, and education. A graduate of Spelman College (B.A. History) and the New England Culinary Institute (A.O.S. Culinary Arts), she began her career in the celebrated kitchens of New Orleans, working at NOLA Restaurant, Emeril's Restaurant, and Peristyle as a Line Cook, Banquet Chef, and Sous Chef from 1996 to 2004. In 2008, Chef Kamili transitioned into culinary writing at Emeril's Homebase, where for more than a decade she developed, tested, and edited recipes for cookbooks, magazines, and digital platforms. Her career has also included work as a caterer and personal chef, further expanding her range of expertise. Since 2019, Chef Kamili has served as a Culinary Instructor at NOCCA, where she combines her professional kitchen experience and writing background to inspire and equip the next generation of chefs. She is a ServSafe Food Protection Manager and Certified ServSafe Instructor, and she is currently pursuing certification as a Certified Culinary Educator through the American Culinary Federation.

Dance

Tianna Pourciau Sykes (Chair) is a dance educator, choreographer, and arts administrator with experience spanning 25 years. She earned her Bachelor of Arts in Dance from Kennesaw State University and is currently the Chair of the Dance Department at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts and Artistic Director of NOLA Contemporary Ballet. She began her professional career as a freelance dancer with various dance companies, regional theaters, industrials, and commercial productions. Tianna served as Director of Dance at Rockdale County Public Schools' Academy for the Performing and Visual Arts for five years, where she developed the program's structure and designed and implemented dance curriculum at the county level. As a choreographer, she has created and presented various dance works and productions at the pre-professional and professional level. His studies have led him to research music and dance with recognized culture-bearers in and from Ghana, Cuba, Brazil, Haiti, Honduras, Syria, Jordan, Egypt, Morocco, Spain, and India. Brad previously taught Afro-Cuban drumming for the African Rhythms Drum & Dance Troupe at UPenn and performed with Philadelphia's renowned Kulu Mele African Dance & Drum Ensemble, as well as with the Arab cultural organization Al-Bustan. Brad is currently a member of New Orleans' premier Afro-Brazilian music and dance institution, Casa Samba, and has also performed with other New Orleans-based African dance groups such as N'Fungola Sibo and Nkiruka. She is currently the Director of Arts at NOCCA and serves on the Dance Faculty. She also works in the New Orleans community as a teaching artist and Dance for Social Change choreographer at Dancing Grounds. She has served as a dance educator for over 25 years and demonstrates a commitment to sustaining the artistic voice of Black dancers and choreographers in New Orleans. Kesha is the founding Artistic Director of KM Dance Project, an essential artistic platform for emerging Black choreographers in NOLA. Daniel Zimmer (Faculty) received his formal training in design at New York's Studio and Forum of Stage Design and, for over 30 years, has designed theatre, dance, and opera productions in the New Orleans area. For the past 24 years, Daniel has taught production and stage design at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA) - Entertainment Production Design department.

Jazz Instrumental

Michael Pellera (Faculty) After studying at Berklee College of Music in Boston, Mr. Pellera has been a jazz educator serving New Orleans since 1989. He taught jazz piano and improvisation for fifteen years at Loyola University in New Orleans before joining the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts faculty in 2002. He became the chair of the renowned Jazz department at NOCCA in 2005. Some of his former students include Brian Blade, Jon Cowherd, Jonathan Batiste, Trombone Shorty, Rich Vogel, and others who have created distinguished careers for themselves with artists like Herbie Hancock, Wayne Shorter, Wynton Marsalis, Liz Wright, Joni Mitchell, Lenny Kravitz, and Galactic. In the last 25 years, he has lived in New Orleans and New York, giving his music a unique perspective that draws freely from the influences of the two cities. As a composer, he has created a body of work that encompasses modern jazz harmony, indigenous New Orleans rhythms, and elements of the classic American songbook of the 1930s and the 1940s. He has released two critically acclaimed CDs of his jazz compositions. His first CD, "Cloud Nine," was released in 1997, and his second CD, "Son of Sky," was released in 2001. Both CDs featured a veritable of "who's who" of the New Orleans modern jazz scene, such as Bill Huntington, John Vidacovich, Steve Masakowski, Tony Dagradi, Bill Summers, James Singleton, and Phillip Manuel. In addition, he released two CDs of Jazz standards, "Piano Standard" in 2008 and "Round' Midnight" in 2012. As an arranger and producer, he has worked in a variety of contexts from trio to big band; most notably, on the MAXJAZZ CD release of singer Phillip Manuel's, "Love Happened to Me." This CD featured five original compositions by Pellera as well as his arrangements. He has performed with a multitude of great jazz artists, including Wynton Marsalis, Buddy Rich, Branford Marsalis, Chet Baker, Bobby McFerrin, and Harry Connick Jr.

Chris Severin (Faculty) Chris Severin is an amazingly talented, versatile, and accomplished master-musician from the Treme area of New Orleans. He graduated from the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA) in 1976 during its adolescence and later attended Southern University of New Orleans (SUNO) for music education. The greats Alvin Batiste, Ellis Marsalis, and Walter Payton were all a part of Mr. Severin's musical training. A skilled teacher himself, Mr. Severin believes in and

promotes consistent practice as the path to a musician's success and payoff. His daily discourse often details music history, theory, and fundamentals. In the business for over 30 years, Mr. Severin's extensive client list includes many of the world's most gifted singers and musicians including: Diane Reeves, Dr. John, Terrence Blanchard, Allen Toussaint, Bonnie Raitt, Nicholas Payton, Ellis Marsalis, Wynton Marsalis, Branford Marsalis, Lou Rawls, Alvin Batiste, Herlin Riley, Victor Goines, Irma Thomas and Kent Jordan. Mr. Severin has played his seven-string bass across the globe and is a frequent flyer for the top jazz recording companies such as Blue Note, Rounder, MCA, and Windham Hill Records. He is a member of the <u>Union of New Orleans Musicians</u>, <u>AFM Local 174-496</u>, BMI, the co-owner of Chrisan Music, Lead Engineer at the Box Studios-Studio A, a prior member of Windjammer, Vietnam, Allen Toussaint Band, and holds several sponsorships, including Schecter Guitars and DR Strings. Mr. Severin's universal sound sets him apart. He plays seven-string and acoustic bass for all genres of music, including R&B, jazz, and hip-hop. In his capacity as a faculty member, Mr. Severin provides music, media arts, and jazz instruction for the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA). He also continues to provide private lessons on everything bass and is a teacher during the Sunday Youth Music Workshop at Tipitina's.

Dominic Minix (Faculty) Dominic Minix is a New Orleans guitarist, singer-songwriter, multi-instrumentalist, and producer. As an up-and-coming guitarist, Dominic paid his dues playing with New Orleans jazz elders like the Marsalis Family at historic venues including Tipitina's, Preservation Hall, and the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival. Dominic went on to record and tour with major artists Solange and Christian Scott aTunde Adjuah. Dominic's guitar work is featured on NPR Tiny Desk and on Christian Scott's Grammy-nominated album "The Emancipation Procrastination." Through his time playing home New Orleans, he has performed with Saul Williams, Tank and the Bangas, opened for Stevie Wonder, John Schofield, Dr. John, and more, and built his own projects exploring the sonic expanses of punk rock, modern jazz, and hip hop. Dominic has produced multiple projects as a band leader of the neo soul-influenced Dominic Minix Quartet (Introducing) and the punk rock-jazz outfit Yung Vul (Cannonball Adderall). As a solo artist, Dominic produced several hip hop and singer-songwriter projects, including "85 and Ride," "Sun Will Show Again," and "Works on Progress," a compilation he produced in partnership with Community Records, highlighting and benefiting Black artists from the Gulf Coast. In 2020, Dominic released the highly acclaimed New Tone ska band, Bad Operation, with a self-released debut full-length album. Dominic's latest release is the spring 2022 full-length ambient jazz album entitled "Swim."

Stephen Gladney (Faculty) Gladney, a 2024 Foundation for Louisiana World Maker and sixth-generation New Orleans native, hails from the city's iconic Lower 9th Ward. With a professional career that began at just 12, Gladney brings a wealth of experience, an infectious spirit, and a signature "Gladney Bow" hairstyle to every performance, making him a truly unforgettable artist. A graduate of both the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA) and the New School for Jazz & Contemporary Music, Gladney's early achievements include being selected for the esteemed Thelonious Monk Institute of Jazz (now the Herbie Hancock Institute) All-Star group. This role took him across the U.S., performing educational jazz "informances" with jazz greats Lisa Henry and Antonio Hart. During this time, Gladney was also honored to perform at the White House under the Obama administration. With a 20-year career spanning high-profile performances, music videos, and live TV appearances, Gladney has been seen on The Kelly & Ryan Show, Late Night with Seth Meyers, and BBC's The Graham Norton Show. His international collaborations feature an impressive roster of artists, including Jonathan Batiste, Jake Shears of Scissor Sisters, Ellis Marsalis, George Duke, Delfeayo Marsalis, Solange, and Joe Dyson. A two-time GRAMMY nominee, he contributed to Christian Scott aTunde Adjuah's 2018 album, The Emancipation Procrastination, on the track "Cages" and

played a key role in the creation of The Rumble's Stories From the Battlefield. Currently, Gladney leads his self-titled band, with the debut single "Selenite," released in 2021, marking the beginning of his band's recording journey. He is a proud member of the Recording Academy and serves as the woodwind instructor at his alma mater, NOCCA, leading the next generation of musicians.

Xavier Reed (Chair) Xavier Reed is a dynamic multi-instrumentalist, songwriter, composer, producer, and educator born and raised in New Orleans, LA. Ever since Xavier graduated from the NOCCA Jazz department in 2013, he has been working closely with NOCCA students; first as a visiting artist, then as a full-time faculty member, and now as the Department Chair of the renowned Jazz program, where he teaches Trumpet and Drumset. He graduated Summa Cum Laude from the University of New Orleans in 2017 and has been working as a teacher and gigging musician in New Orleans and abroad. Xavier has played and/or recorded with artists such as *Tank and The Bangaz*, *ÌFÉ*, *Bill Summers*, *Saul Williams*, *Big Freida*, *GLADNEY*, *Steve Lands*, *Dominic Minix*, *Zack Villere*, and more. Xavier Reed is a dedicated teacher, musician, and lover of the arts with a deep passion for the world and its people.

Shelly Short (Chair) is an award-winning photographer and filmmaker with over 25 years of visual and media arts experience. Shelly works professionally as an independent filmmaker and photographer and has worked with companies including RE/MAX Realty Group and Keller Williams Realty. Shelly is in her 9th year of chairing high school film and media programs, with the last three proudly here at NOCCA.

Sarah Devlin (Faculty) is a filmmaker and multimedia artist based in New Orleans. Her work blends digital media with hands-on techniques—like stop motion, projection, puppetry, and miniature set design—often using recycled and found materials. She's drawn to processes that mix media and favor texture, imperfection, and experimentation. She also worked under the renowned director Tadashi Suzuki in *Kachikachiyama*, *Ivanov*, and *Cinderella*. Her stage work has

Marcus Brown (Faculty), Website: https://artistmarcus.com/ - A native of New Orleans, Marcus Brown is a sculptor, painter, inventor, musician, and educator. Brown holds a M.Ed. from Portland State University and a BFA from the Kansas City Institute of Art (KCAI) in Missouri. His work is expansive and includes national and international exhibits and performances in New York City, Berlin, Germany, and Krakow, Poland, the Ogden Museum of Southern Art, McKenna Art Gallery, and the New Orleans Museum of Art, to name a few. Brown currently has public sculptures in Biloxi, Mississippi (Human Universal Musical Sound [HUMS]) and The New Leaf on St. Bernard Ave., St. Peter Claver, and Henriette Delille at St. Peter Claver School in New Orleans. He also has sound sculptures at JAMNOLA

and recently developed a public piece for interactive display at the 2022 New Orleans French Quarter Festival. Mentors like the late Lin Emery, John T. Scott, and Jim Leedy collectively instilled in Brown the importance of always learning and experimenting to create your own path. In that vein, Brown developed a form of painting called Electro-sonic Painting in which the artist paints with sound/data-producing instruments. He has performed with his invention in several venues, both locally and nationally. In addition to his performance art, Brown has exhibited with artists such as Andy Warhol, Chris Burden, Hannah Wilke, and others around the world. Brown is currently combining a new form of creative storytelling using Augmented Reality (AR) sculptures with interactive multimedia elements. His latest project, Passage, is a geotagged musically interactive augmented reality (AR) sculpture installation series based on slave ships and enslaved peoples.

Terry DeRoche (Faculty) is an accomplished artist and educator with over 25 years of experience teaching visual arts at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA). With a background in both fine arts and special education, DeRoche holds an M.Ed. in Gifted & Talented Education from the University of New Orleans and a B.F.A. in Photography from the Maine College of Art At NOCCA, DeRoche has developed and taught curriculum in digital media, drawing, and painting, while also serving in leadership roles including Summer Department Chair, Arts Expanded core team member, and faculty representative on the NOCCA|Institute Board. Beyond teaching, DeRoche has contributed as a computer technician, designer of institutional publications, and mentor for emerging artists. DeRoche's professional practice spans photography and digital media, with exhibitions ranging from local faculty showcases to international exhibitions in Prague and juried shows curated by leading museum professionals. Their design work has been featured in publications, performance programs, and book projects, with many self-published photography collections. A dedicated arts advocate, DeRoche has earned recognition, including multiple National Scholastic Art & Writing Educator Gold Medals and a SURDNA Arts Teachers Fellowship. They have presented nationally on arts education, digital media, and curriculum development, and have served as juror, visiting artist, and mentor in various academic and community arts settings. DeRoche's career reflects a deep commitment to fostering creativity, advancing arts education, and sustaining an active studio practice.

Laura Vélez (Faculty) is a Puerto Rican artist whose multidisciplinary practice spans painting, drawing, and sculptural installation. Centered on the human figure, her work investigates identity, cultural heritage, and personal narrative through portraiture and figurative imagery. Raised in Louisiana, Vélez graduated from the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA). Her work has also been featured in several catalogues and publications, including New American Paintings and Hispanic Women Making Art: Creative Empowerment and Identity. In addition, her works have been commissioned for private collections nationally and internationally.

Jade Thiraswas (Faculty) is a Thai-American artist from New Orleans, Louisiana, raised between the Gulf South and Southeast Asia. Drawing from her roots as what she playfully calls Cajun Asian, Jade's work explores the layered experiences of identity, community, and cultural preservation. She works primarily in photography, often in close collaboration with her subjects, challenging traditional boundaries of authorship and representation—especially within documentary practices shaped by colonialism, otherness, and patriarchy. Her long-term projects unfold naturally over time, taking on a spirit of visual ethnography—grounded in research, deep listening, trust, sensitivity, and care. Jade is an alum of the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts, where she first discovered her love for the visual arts. She earned her BFA in photography and art history from Memphis College of Art in 2015 and her MFA in photography & related media from Rochester Institute of Technology in 2018. Her work has been exhibited nationally and internationally, she's contributed to *The New York Times*, is a member of Women Photograph, and has learned a lot through artist residencies, portfolio reviews, internships, and a variety of workshops. These days, she's back in her hometown—getting reconnected with her Cajun Asian heritage, playing with her poodle, eating beaucoup good food, and

teaching at NOCCA, the very place where her creative journey first began. She brings an expanded perspective into the classroom, introducing students to a diverse view of contemporary art and the many paths available to working artists.

Vocal Music

Phyllis Treigle (Chair) is a native of New Orleans and is the daughter of the great bass-baritone Norman Treigle. She holds a B.M. and M.M. from Loyola University and made her professional debut with the New Orleans Opera Association in 1980. She has since appeared with this company several times, most notably as Senta in Der fliegende Holländer in 1998. She was a member of the Houston Grand Opera Studio in the early 1980s and appeared in several roles with Houston Grand Opera. Miss Treigle has also appeared with the New York City Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Dublin Grand Opera Society, Pittsburgh Opera, Sarasota Opera Association, and Wolf Trap Opera Company, among others. In 1997, Ms. Treigle portrayed the title role in the original version of Cherubini's Médée, for Opera Quotannis, at Alice Tully Hall, Lincoln Center, which was subsequently recorded by Newport Classic. More recent performing credits include the role of Dame Marthe Schwerlein in Faust and the role of Mamma Lucia in Cavalleria rusticana, with the New Orleans Opera Association in 2017. Ms. Treigle joined the faculty of the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA) in 2001 and has been Department Chair of Vocal Music since 2006. She will portray the role of Madame de Croissy in New Orleans Opera's production of Dialogues des Carmélites in March 2026.

Brandon Banks (Faculty) began his music studies at the age of 14 and became a self-taught pianist. At 16, he began his theatrical debut as musical director with the show *Guys and Dolls* (2011) in his hometown of New Bern, NC. He began his formal studies at East Carolina University and obtained a bachelor's degree in Music Education with a concentration in Choral Music (2016) and a master's degree in Piano Performance (2018). In 2018, he relocated to further his education at Florida State University.
